BUSINESS CHANGE.—M. Menor of this place this week bought the general merchandise store owned by F. P. Hogan at Roseburg and took possession on Friday morning of this week. Alve and William Menor are now in charge but the latter will soon return to open out the new store here at the old Jones' corner. Mr. Menor has numerous sons and he proposes starting them all in business while he will act as superintendent over the whole.

RELIGIOUS ITEMS.—Rev. A. C. Fairchild preaches at Phoenix Sunday, at the usual hour. Elder H. C. Fleming will hold services at the Mound school house Sunday next. Rev. P. A. Moses will hold services in this place Sunday morning and evening. There will be no services at the Catholic church in this place, on account of Rev. M. J. Stratten's absence in Yreka. The quarterly meeting of the M. E. church will be at Grant's Pass Saturday and Sunday. Rev. A. R. Bickenbach will preach at the Presbyterian church in this place, both Sunday morning and evening.

THE BIG YAK.—This much talked of mine at Galice creek has now taken a boom and with present indications will soon astonish the natives with its richness. While at Grants Pass this week we learned that the California parties who had it in bond, had ordered prospecting stopped, being well satisfied with assays made from numerous portions of the mine, and declared their intention of taking the mines for the amount of the bond. A large stamp mill has been ordered and it will not be long before Galice creek will be one of the liveliest mining camps ever found on the Pacific coast. Prospecting on other ledges continues and rich discoveries are promised from other well known ledges in that section.

GOT CLEAR.—Readers of the SENTINEL will remember that Augustine Schmitt was arrested near Dayton, W. T., some time since for an assault with a dangerous weapon on C. H. Reed, both former residents of Jacksonville. The row occurred over some family trouble but after a thorough examination the grand jury ignored the charge and set defendant at liberty. Mr. Schmitt is well and favorably known here, being a son of Mrs. Du Rebon of this place, and all will be pleased to hear that he has been exonerated of the charge. The defendant, being unable to furnish bonds, has had to lay in jail since February last, when the alleged crime was said to have been committed, and the whole matter looks like a case of persecution.

KLAMATH COURT.—The large end of our legal fraternity is not expected back from Linkville before the end of next week. A true bill was found against Clint Brown by the grand jury for the murder of John Walker, and this case alone will probably take a week for its trial. Since our last issue the following proceedings have taken place:

Q. A. Brooks vs. Big Klamath Ditch Co.; injunction. Demurrer sustained.

J. H. Colahan vs. Amos Sheek; injunction. To be argued at chambers in Jacksonville during vacation.

State vs. Clinton Brown; indictment for murder in the first degree. On trial.

LATER.—From parties just in from Linkville we learn that the Brown murder case has been postponed until the next regular September term, a change of venue having been denied.

VERY LITTLE BUSINESS now remains to be transacted at this term.

OBITUARY.—Mrs. Helen Pickens, relict of the late Cyrus H. Pickens, died at the old homestead on Rogue river June 15th, 1885. Mrs. Pickens came with her husband, two sons and two daughters, to Siskiyou county, California in 1859 and lived there 6 years, and removed to Jackson county in 1865 and has resided here continuously ever since. In the fall of 1866 the youngest daughter Helen, an amiable and accomplished young lady of 17 years died in Jacksonville and a few years later the husband and father departed this life, and since that time Mrs. Pickens, who has been an invalid for several years has lived with her two sons, and has enjoyed the sweet, calm content of the evening of a well spent life, her every wish anticipated by the loving hands of children and grand children. She had been a faithful member of the M. E. Church and died in full assurance of the faith. She leaves two sons, E. P. and Commissioner Pickens of Sams valley and one daughter, the wife of Rev. J. S. McCaia of Hillsboro, and a large circle of friends to mourn her loss. She was buried in the Jacksonville cemetery on Wednesday afternoon; the funeral services were conducted at the grave by Rev. A. R. Bickenbach.

Our Central Point friends remembered us with some fine cake this week—having had a larger supply than was required for the ball on Friday night of last week. The ball was a success, the cake could not be excelled and we only hope that they will announce parties of this kind oftener.

Grants Pass has been designated as the county seat for Josephine county after January 1st but the location of the county buildings has not yet been decided upon. The Commissioners have two propositions, and at their regular meeting to be held next month they will decide where the location shall be made.

Gen. T. G. Roames was elected grand master of the Grand Lodge of Free Masons of Oregon that met in Portland last week, and R. S. Dunlap who has been Tyler of Warren Lodge of Jacksonville for 25 consecutive years, was elected Grand Tyler. We are pleased to see our worthy citizens so signally honored when abroad.

We are pained to note the death of Hon. J. W. Nesmith which occurred at his home in Dixie, Polk county, on Wednesday at noon. Col. Nesmith was an Oregon pioneer, and a United States Senator from this State, he was a man of brilliant intellect, and great natural abilities, and his death will be deeply regretted by the people of this State.

In East Portland the same day, the democrats elected Mayor, Recorder and one councilman, and the republicans elected Marshal, Treasurer, Assessor and three councilmen.

A petition for abolishing courts of justice would be next in order as the expense of trial does not justify a conviction when the criminal can escape so easily. We hope people will take a second thought before signing the petition.

McElroy, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, has issued a circular stating that the State Teachers' Association will convene at Astoria, Monday evening July 6th, and continue in session July 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th. All teachers and friends of education are cordially invited to attend and aid in promoting and developing the educational work of our State.

John A. Wiley and wife of Massachusetts, paid Jacksonville a two days visit this week. Mr. Wiley is a brother-in-law of Fred Downing of Batte with whom they have been visiting for some time past. They were well pleased with this county, which Mr. D. had visited 15 years since, and especially with Jacksonville. Mr. D. says that after 15 years travel over the United States he would be well pleased to make his home with us.

Our old friend Howard of Medford is building a two story brick store, and says he will have a grand parlor in the upper story for his lady customers, and will have a brass band to play on the piazza in front every evening. Howard is a lady's man and will spare no pains to please his lady customers, but we promised not to do this as it is intended as a grand surprise, and that is why we haven't said anything about it.

Hon. John H. Mitchell was in Jacksonville yesterday on his way home to Portland. He came on business with Mr. Huffer by whom he has been retained as counsel in his suit against the parties East who have infringed upon his patent. Although he comes as a private citizen on private business the knowledge of his arrival created the greatest enthusiasm, and hosts of friends without regard to party affiliations united in extending to one of Oregon's most honored and most worthy citizens a cordial welcome, after his long absence. He is in excellent health, and looks as well as he did a score of years ago. The people of this State hold him in grateful remembrance, as one of Oregon's most faithful representatives, and his return will be hailed with gladness by his multitude of friends all over the State.

As ex-Senator John H. Mitchell was preparing to leave for the north last night, he was surprised by a serenade by the Silver Cornet Band. Although his arrival was unannounced and he insisted on being received as a private citizen, the enthusiasm of our people was so great that they could not be restrained from doing him this honor. Mr. Mitchell arose in the carriage that he had already entered to carry him to Medford and in a few well chosen words expressed his high appreciation of the cordial greeting that he had received from the people of Southern Oregon of both political parties, which was an earnest welcome to his Oregon home. The streets were filled with persons who had assembled to do honor to our distinguished ex-representative, and as his carriage was driven out of town the hills re-echoed the sweet strains of music and loud hurrahs that had filled the air.

We this week received the fifteenth annual catalogue and circular of the Bishop Scott Grammar School a boarding and day school for young men, conducted under the auspices of the Episcopal church. Board of Immigration.

MEDFORD JACKSON COUNTY, OREGON, JUNE 16, 1885.

Pursuant to a call by the chairman the Jackson County Board of Immigration, met at one o'clock P. M., on the day above mentioned. The board was called to order by the chairman, J. B. Wrisley. Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted. The chairman stated that the object of the meeting, was to determine whether the board shall publish a descriptive pamphlet of Jackson county or not. A. J. Daley moved that the secretary of the board, be required to make a statement of the immigration work he has done, while acting as secretary, carried. The secretary then read letters he had written descriptive of Jackson county. A. L. Johnson submitted a pamphlet published by Klamath county, as an example of the manner in which the different subjects should be treated. On motion of J. H. Griffiths the secretary was ordered to obtain information as to the cost of writing and publishing 5,000 pamphlets of about twenty pages each, descriptive of Jackson county; and also to have those who have already written up the resources of the county to present their manuscript at the next regular meeting of the board. After considerable discussion on matters of immigration, the secretary tendered his resignation, which was accepted by the board. J. H. Griffiths was then elected secretary. Hon. H. B. Miller of Josephine county, read a letter before the board, outlining the work he considered most necessary for them to do, in order to have their county properly represented. He also spoke at some length on immigration in general; at the conclusion of his remarks the board showed its appreciation by thanking him for the advice and information given. On motion a recess of five minutes was taken to draw up written instructions to the secretary as follows, to-wit: The secretary shall collect specimens of the vegetable, mineral and manufactured productions of the county, to place on exhibition at the immigration rooms at Medford, and also forward specimens to the State board of immigration at Portland. The secretary was given an order, for fifty dollars of the fund appropriated for immigration purposes, to be used in defraying the expenses of collecting specimens. On motion of G. F. Pennebaker, the meeting adjourned to meet Friday July 3, 1885.

The Iowa Press Association arrived at Medford at 9:30 yesterday morning and were tendered a grand impromptu reception by the citizens of Medford and Jacksonville. When our people found that it would be impossible for the press association to visit Jacksonville, they determined like Mohamed to go to the mountain. And several carloads of people headed by the Silver Cornet Band, in their handsome new regalia and magnificent band wagon, repaired to our neighboring town to greet these distinguished visitors. The Jacksonvilleians drove up in procession along side the train and after some fine music by the band, Hon. N. Langell, arose in his buggy, and in a neat and appropriate speech welcomed the visitors in behalf of the people of Jacksonville, and A. L. Johnson, Esq., occupying the same place extended a cordial welcome to the citizens of Medford. Hon. L. A. Young and President Swain acknowledged the courtesies on behalf of the excursionists. Hon. Lafayette Young said he had met people from Iowa in every place he had been except the Oregon penitentiary. The two speakers expressed the appreciation of the entire party for their magnificent reception throughout the State which had been a continued ovation since their arrival in Portland, and at no place had they met with as much enthusiasm an impromptu reception as from the citizens of Medford and Jacksonville. Only a few minutes time were allowed the excursionists for welcomes and farewells, when the bell sounded the time for departure, and the train rolled on bearing with it the good wishes of the assembled multitude.
