Board of Pardons

Robert W. Hill, S. E. Josephi and A. Bash, the Advisory Board of Pardons, have issued rules to govern applications for pardons. These rules have been approved by Governor Moody. In substance they are as follows: All applications must be made in writing to the Governor. No personal solicitation will be considered. No application will be considered that has not been advertised in the county where the criminal was convicted.

All petitions for pardon or commutation should set forth the offense for which the applicant was convicted, the date of his conviction, the substance of the sentence in full, and the reasons, considerations and facts on which the application is based; also, the character and habits of the person prior to his arrest.

If judgment was pronounced on a plea of guilty, and no evidence heard on the trial of case, a copy of the indictment or information should be furnished.

In applications based upon the grounds of a mistrial, or improper conviction, the allegations should be sustained by such reasons and evidence as would have been a good ground for a new trial; and in applications based upon the ground of newly discovered evidence, the evidence should be such as would, in all probability, have produced an acquittal on a former trial.

If the offense was committed in a county different from that in which the trial occurred, there should be statements from officers and citizens of the county in which the offense was committed.

If possible, the statements of the prosecuting witness, or witnesses, as well as that of as many of the jurors as can be obtained, should also accompany the application.

Regular meetings will be held at Salem on the fourth Tuesday of January, April, July and October. Special meetings will be held at the call of the Governor.

The Postoffices

The officials of the postoffice department have completed the second annual adjustment of the salaries of postoffices of the presidential rank. This is the first adjustment made upon the basis of the reduction of letter postage to two cents. Of course this reduction has operated to the disadvantage of the offices, as the salary is predicated upon the receipts, but, still, many offices have so added to their business that, while no increase of pay is secured, they have been able to retain the present salary.

As stated, this adjustment only includes offices of the presidential rank, so termed because the pay being at least \$1000 a year the appointment of the postmaster is vested by law in the president. They are divided into three classes.

The following statement gives the presidential postoffices in Oregon, together with the present salary and the salary as arranged under the new adjustment, which takes effect with the opening of the fiscal year:
