

Mormons Sick of Polygamy.

BUT FOR A FEW LEADERS THEY WOULD HAVE TILDED LONG AGO.

A correspondent writing from Salt Lake City, July 1, to the Philadelphia "Times" says: The very best thing that could happen to the Mormons today would be the coming to the front of a man who would advise and lead them intelligently. They have suffered all that one community should be called upon to endure, from inspired leadership. Now what they most need is common sense and ordinary judgment. The head men do not yet fully realize that polygamy must go. Virtually, however, the institution of plural marriage is dead; so severely has it been struck that if let alone hereafter it is questionable if it could recover. The people themselves are heartily tired of the business; and I do not mean the mongrel Mormonism, but the mass of polygamists also, who secretly rejoice over the knowledge that the end is at hand. Aside from the trouble and expense that polygamy has brought them from the outside, it has been full of misery and discontent at home. Neither women nor men have been able to adjust themselves to the unnatural condition of things. They might profess satisfaction in the relation, and to the world assume an air of peace and contentment, but under the surface there has ever been a little hell, torturing women and grievously annoying men.

John Taylor and George Q. Cannon are not the men for the occasion. Taylor is a rank bigot and is not a man of brains. He is incapable of grasping the situation and has not the wisdom and foresight to take the best circumstances. Cannon is unquestionably an able man, learned in the ways of the world and abounding in resource, but he has not been himself since congress kicked him out of the house three or four years ago. He is represented as being desperate and as refusing to listen to any proposition looking to a surrender to the inevitable. He knows as well as other intelligent persons know that the stubborn resistance against the inevitable means; he knows that it means more suffering for his people, but he is one of those obstinate men who prefer ruin by force to submission voluntarily after their minds have been once made up.

With Taylor and Cannon out of the way, I believe there would be a ready and cheerful submission to the Edmunds law, at least to the extent of the absolute prohibition of future polygamous marriages and the closing of the mouths of the preachers and advocates of the practice. It may be marked down here that the Mormons have had about all the imprisonment they want, and if the church will not help them to escape the jail they will help themselves, which they can easily do by simply promising to obey the law which most of them are sorry they ever violated.

"Press Excursion Aftermath."

"Aftermath" is good, but "after grub" would have been better—if the Oregonian will permit the liberty. It was on last Thursday, says a Portland exchange last week, that we recognized one of the Iowa press excursionists sauntering down Stark street as if in search of the customary tables "groaning under the weight of ham sandwiches and pie," that seemed to rush out and meet them at every way station in the State, and noticing his disappointed look we inquired: "Get left?" "No; came out here to stay." "You did, eh? Going to start a paper, I suppose?" "Well, no. I'm not a journalist." "Printer?" "No; I'm a clerk." Although this young man is perhaps the only one of the Hawkeye tourists who remained here, he is not by any means the only one of the party who was sailing under false colors. About fifty of the party were genuine editors, and the rest were "kid" reporters, friends of the publishers, and old hayseeds who write up the "agricultural column" for papers. One of the real journalists of the party said he was disgusted with the fraud that had been perpetrated on the extremely kind people of Oregon by the stay-at-home editors who gave their ticket to anybody, boy or girl, who would agree to "write up" the trip, and that when he got back to work he intended coaling them with all the intensity of an Iowa cyclone. Had the 300 or more in the Iowa party been editors or publishers, we should feel, if anything, we had not done enough for them, but as it is, the impression bubbles up that we have wasted a good deal of sweetness on the desert air—that we have been to a certain extent "taken in."

Murder Most Foul.

The following particulars of a brutal murder we find in the columns of the Baker City "Sage Brush," bearing the date of July 9th: "Yesterday morning about half past two o'clock now reached this city that a foul murder was committed last Tuesday morning near the Malheur agency. The messenger reported that a man by the name of John Cooley had shot and killed James Lavery, a farmer and stock raiser of that section. Immediately a warrant was issued by Justice Boynton and placed in the hands of Sheriff Dealy, who at once dispatched a deputy to the agency to serve the warrant. The particulars as near as we can learn are as follows: A dispute arose between the two men as to which one was the rightful owner of a piece of land they both claimed. Lavery claiming that he had done everything required by law, had made final proof and that the land belonged to him, while Cooley maintained that as he had a prior claim he was the rightful owner. On the morning of the 6th inst. John Lavery, brother and partner of the deceased, in company with two hired men commenced cutting hay on the land. They had not been at work but a few minutes when they were fired upon by a person concealed in the brush near by. The men thinking it dangerous to remain immediately stopped work and returned home. On the following morning James Lavery thinking there was no danger whatever, and considering the shooting of the previous day as a mere bluff, repaired to the field, and was about to commence work when he was confronted by a 50 calibre needle gun in the hands of Cooley, who leveled his gun at Lavery's head, fired, the ball entering the left arm between the elbow and wrist passed through his heart. The citizens of the surrounding country immediately after the killing turned out en masse to capture the murderer, but at last accounts had not succeeded in capturing him. The deceased was about 28 years of age. He was always considered a quiet and peaceful citizen and was highly respected by the better class of people who knew him. He leaves a mother, sister and two brothers to mourn his sudden and unexpected death.

OREGON'S MEMORIAL STONE.—At the last session of the legislature the sum of \$2000 was appropriated for a memorial stone from this state to be placed in the Washington monument, in a niche left for that purpose, and the contract for executing this work was let to John Woods of Albany. He has been engaged upon the work for some time, and expects to have the stone completed by August 1st. Although several states have expended much more than Oregon for a memorial stone, it is stated that none yet sent from any state will surpass this one when completed. It is to consist of three kinds of Oregon stone. The stone itself is a brown sandstone bearing on its face a landscape containing the coat of arms of the state surrounded by fruits and flowers, the whole enclosed with a raised moulding. The stars surrounding the state shield are to be of a greenish syenite set into the sandstone, and the snow capped mountains are to be represented by white marble, also set in the brown sandstone.—"Oregonian."

INFORMATION WANTED.—A letter has been received by Marshal Harbord, of Salem, asking for information of John L. Blades, who left his home in Baltimore, Md., on the 20th of September, 1883. His mother makes the inquiry, and a piteous appeal for his return. She has heard that he was connected with the department of Indian affairs in this western country some where. He is described as a man of five feet nine inches in height, with light reddish hair, and twenty-six years of age. He weighed about 140 pounds when he left home. The Most Profitable Horse.

Farmers make a mistake when they slight the advantages to be derived from keeping good horses, and from breeding a pair or two of colts every year. A three-year-old colt can be reared as cheaply as a cow of the same age, but while an ordinary price for a young three year old colt is forty dollars, a young colt is worth seventy-five dollars at the very least, when a year old, and one hundred and fifty dollars when three years old. If, however, a good thoroughbred sire is used, at the cost of fifty dollars, the colt at three years may easily be worth three hundred dollars. Roadsters in the north, and saddle horses in the south (both are really roadsters,) are the most desirable animals to rear. The thoroughbred blood is like the steel one puts into a machine; it gives strength, firmness, lightness, durability, elasticity and vigor into the cold blood. The bone is harder, and more solid, and lighter; the sinews are stronger and more elastic; the muscles are firmer, and have greater tension; the lungs are more capacious; the weight is reduced, and with more strength and elasticity of motion, and less weight, we have swiftness and ease of movement.—Ex.
