

A Loco Remedy.

Considerable interest is being manifested in the ravages of the "loco" weed, which seems to be spreading in the stock ranges of the southwest, where it has never before been known. It has generally been supposed that there was no effectual remedy for an animal which had been poisoned from eating the weed, but an Illinois stockman who has had a good deal of experience in this direction, "on the plains" gives some valuable directions on the subject. A large band of horses were, to the extent of 75 per cent. of their number, affected with the poison to more or less extent. Those slightly poisoned were treated by giving them plentiful doses of grease or oil, and spreading it on the hay with which they were fed. Grain was also given them in such quantity as could be obtained. The oil acted as a cathartic, but the principle benefit seemed to be obtained from keeping the animals off the range where the weed abounded and feeding them on cultivated hay. Deprived of fresh supplies of the loco weed, the effects of the poison seemed gradually to work off, where too much had been taken into the system. It was found that the deleterious principle of the loco weed is a strong narcotic poison, and as nuxvomica, itself an active poison, is an antidote for narcotics, it was determined to make a trial of it in the case of two horses very badly affected. Fifteen drops of the tincture of nuxvomica were given twice a day, with the result that in a month the animals had so far recovered as to readily do their portion of the work assigned them, though, of course, they were not in as good condition as if they had never been poisoned. Strychnia, which is the active principle of nuxvomica, may be used instead, in which case the dose should be for a horse one or two grains; an ox, one to three grains, and for a sheep, one-half a grain.

Should this remedy prove to be as efficacious as claimed, then a discovery has been made of the very highest importance for stockmen all over the West. Up to this time it has been supposed that there was nothing which would eventually counteract the loco poison, and it is to be hoped, now that the beneficial properties of the drug mentioned have been tested with good result, that no time will be lost by other stockmen in thoroughly developing this remedy.—"San Francisco Chronicle."

The Festive Higgins.

The San Francisco Chronicle thinks Mr. Higgins, the appointment clerk of the Treasury Department, would be a most amusing creature if he were not sporting with the bread and butter of so many better people than himself. He goes round the department with slips of paper in his hand, pokes his head through a door and cheerfully mutters to himself: "I must have two heads out of this room—may be four." Fancy how pleasant for the poor devils whose heads are thus threatened. His delight is said to be to drop on the female clerks, and pleasantly assure them they had better "prepare for the worst." In Stephens's recent book on Russia he describes an agent of police who diverts his leisure by walking through the prisons and confidentially telling each prisoner: "You will probably be knouted to-morrow; after that you may be sent to Siberia. Perhaps you won't, but you'd best look out." This must be a brother of Higgins—his double.

After all, Higgins is probably only doing what he is told. He is the "Jorkins" of the Treasury firm; the smiling Mr. Manning is the "Spenslow." Manning would like to keep everybody in office; he would not deprive a poor clerk of his head for the world. It is that horrid Higgins who goes round croaking and saying that he must have heads. Philip II never wanted anybody's head cut off; it was the herid Duke of Alva who was forever decapitating people and nursing them at the stake. But when the correspondence between the king and his General came to be published, it turned out that Alva only obeyed orders. We have no doubt that Manning occasionally intercedes with Higgins on behalf of some unfortunate victim for whose head the hacket is yawning. He must be like "Fascination Fledgeby" when he used to intercede with old "Riah" on behalf of some unfortunate debtor whom he had ordered "Riah" to settle up.

We can tell the office holders in Washington that the sooner they make up their minds to go the less worry they will have. They will have to go in the end. There are too many hungry Democrats roaring up and down the country and seeking what they can do, to render it if possible for the Administration to keep Republican noses at the public crib. As Higgins says, Cleveland must have heads. He can never stand the pressure from the Democrat Senators and Congressmen if he don't throw them some scraps of patronage. Senators and Congressmen have friends for whom they are bound to provide, and if the President refuses to gratify them they will make war upon him and break him down. Any Republican who holds office under the Government and expects to hold throughout Cleveland's administration is destined to cruel disappointment.

Major Jones reports that the proper way of overcoming obstacles at the Cascades, on the Columbia river, is by a canal and a system of locks extending over a space of thirteen miles and costing about \$11,000,000. But as it would require a very long period of time to excavate the canal—which, indeed, from a statement of the obstacles appears to be a work only second in magnitude to the Panama canal—he proposed in the mean time a portage over the railway tracks, to cost something like a million and a quarter. Those who have read Stanley's account of his passage on the catenacts on the Congo will understand how the thing can be done.

No one but a competent engineer is qualified to form a judgment on Major Jones's projects. But it is clear that the navigation of that noble stream ought to be improved at the national cost, even if it did cost as much as \$11,000,000. The Columbia is destined to prove as important to the Pacific coast as the Hudson river is to the East and the Mississippi to the South. Whatever engineering can do to make it navigable throughout its length ought to be done. It is not creditable to American enterprise that the blockade above The Dalles should be permitted to exist, and we trust that Congress will lose no time, when it assembles, in appropriating money to remove the obstructions.

Dashed to Death.

The messenger for the United Carriage and Baggage Company, who arrived yesterday, reports a frightful accident at the Cascades at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. A party of five souls consisting of M. Hanson, a carpenter, Mr. Schmiedler, a saloon keeper and his wife and baby, and John Sliter another saloon keeper, attempted to cross the river a short distance above the Cascades. The object was to sail from the north to the south side of the Columbia river in order to catch the train on the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Railroad, which was bound for The Dalles, where they intended to visit Robinson's circus in the evening. Fall of life and fun and happy in the anticipation of passing a pleasant night at the circus, the party embarked, hoisted their sail and were soon in the middle of the river when the wind suddenly gave out, and not realizing the awful danger that lay down the stream only a short distance, allowed the boat to drift toward the rapids. It was not till their frail craft began to move with great swiftness, owing to the narrowness of the banks, that they realized their extreme peril. When they saw that death was staring them in the face the only pair of oars in the boat were put into active use, and these might have saved them, but unfortunately an oar lock broke and the boat shot like an arrow into the surging waters. For awhile it kept an even keel, while the terrified parties shrieked in terror and prayed loudly for preservation. Then the boat shot beneath the raging rapids and five lives disappeared and were lost in the twinkling of an eye. Where a few moments before there was a boat-load of happy people, nothing was to be seen but the angry rapids with the white mists rising above them, as though the souls of the dead were ascending heavenward.

The Government lifeboat was manned and tried to save the unfortunate people, but their efforts were abortive. The boat was picked up in a badly damaged condition four miles below the Cascades, but no trace was found of the bodies of the drowned. Quite a number of persons have been swept over these falls in times gone by, but their remains have never been found.—"The Portland News."

Rights of the Press

In a recent libel suit in Rhode Island a Chief Justice, in his charge to the jury, laid down the law on the rights of the press as follows:—I think that the public newspapers have a right to comment upon and criticize in the discharge of public duties. I think that if the publishers discover what they consider to be defects they have a right to point them out. If there are facts which suggest fault I think that the public press has a right to criticize and to censure. If in the exercise of this freedom of comment they act fairly and honestly, and meaning to do what is right, they cannot be held accountable. It is of great importance to the public that the newspapers should have this liberty. If there should be none to censure or to criticize, frauds would grow more and more intolerable; to the manifest peril of the public welfare, and therefore, you can see that the public have a great interest in maintaining unshackled the right of the public press to freely and fairly criticize.
