

ANALYZING THE BAKING POWDER.

"ROYAL" THE ONLY ABSOLUTELY PURE BAKING POWDER MADE—ACTION OF THE NEW YORK STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Money Shipped  
OUT OF THE COUNTY ANNUALLY AND HOW IT IS REPLACED.

The people of this county have often wondered how much money is shipped out annually for imports—goods, wares, merchandise, machinery, etc.—and how and from what source it is replaced.

It is frequently remarked by persons who do not take into consideration our resources that the country is being continually impoverished by the drafts made upon it and that under this constant drain our resources must sooner or later be exhausted and the country be left without the necessary means to meet its demands.

In order to approximate as near as may be to the amount of money annually sent out of the county for all purposes we will take as a basis the population and estimate that there are ten thousand all told in the county; and that these consume on an average twelve and one half cents per day each of imported goods, including the waste, wear and tear to each of machinery, farming implements etc. This consumption will amount then to twelve hundred and fifty dollars per day or a little over four hundred and fifty six thousand dollars a year. This is only an estimate but it is probably not far from the true value of imports and consequently would very nearly represent the amount of money annually shipped out of the county. Of this amount a careful itemized statement shows that Jacksonville ships not less and perhaps more than two hundred and seventy five thousand or considerably more than half of the whole amount annually shipped out of the county.

Now the question is how is this large amount of money annually replaced.

Let us estimate again. It is understood, of course, that these figures are subject to revision and criticism, and any one who will take the trouble and assume the responsibility of making a better and more perfect exhibit will have our thanks and we doubt not the thanks of the community.

Total \$464,500. This exhibit will foot up an annual income of four hundred and sixty four thousand five hundred dollars.

There appears to be a grave doubt in the minds of many as to the legality of an act published on page 136 of the Session laws of Oregon, entitled "An act to further simplify proceedings in justices' courts, and repeal chapter 4 of the Justices' code, being part of an act entitled 'An act to regulate the civil and criminal procedure in justices' courts,' and also to repeal section 80 of chapter 9 of the Justices' code." The bill (H. B. No. 5), introduced by Representative Black, of Linn county, passed the house, but was lost in the senate the last day of the session, the vote standing: Ayes, 13; nays, 11; absent, 5; excused, 1. It was probably sent by mistake to the enrolling committee and signed by the presiding officer without examination, and afterwards approved by the governor.

Under the direction of the New York State Board of Health, eighty-four different kinds of baking powders, embracing all the brands that could be found for sale in the State, were submitted to examination and analysis by Prof. C. F. Chandler, a member of the State Board, and President of the New York City Board of Health, assisted by Prof. Edward G. Love, the well-known late United States Government chemist.

The official report shows that a large number of the powders examined were found to contain alum or lime, many of them to such an extent as to render them seriously objectionable for use in the preparation of human food. Alum was found in twenty-nine samples. This drug is employed in baking powders to cheapen their cost. The presence of lime is attributed to the impure cream of tartar of commerce used in their manufacture. Such cream of tartar was also analyzed and found to contain lime and other impurities, in some samples to the extent of ninety-three per cent. of their entire weight.

Exhibit of Home Productions.

The Mechanics' fair is only a few weeks ahead, and it is quite time to begin the preparation of exhibits. It is a special purpose of the management this year to make a complete showing of home productions, and by home productions is meant all that grows or is manufactured in this country. Farm, dairy, orchard and domestic products will be given a prominent place in the pavilion, and in order that the exhibit may be complete farmers of the state are requested to furnish samples. Last year's display was sent to the exposition at New Orleans, where it did good service in advertising the state. County boards of immigration ought to make collections to be exhibited as advertisements of their respective localities. Every manufacturing industry in the state should be represented by an exhibit of its products, and so far as practicable by its processes. It will be necessary to make the "home product" exhibit what it ought to be, for the producers to cooperate with the fair management. The benefit will be mutual. Classification of exhibits, the rules and regulations of the fair, blank applications for space, and all other information desired will be furnished by the superintendent, Mr. A. S. Whiting, who may be addressed at No. 29 Stark street, Portland, Oregon.
