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Oregon on Wheels.

The "Missionary Car" has been on active duty every day since crossing the plains. The first week of September it was at the Okaloosa fair, one of the most important county fairs of Iowa, and is thus spoken of by the "Herald" of that city.

"Our readers are aware that a car of Oregon products was promised as among the fine and entertaining sights to be seen at the County Fair. That promise has been fulfilled, for on Saturday evening the car came in on the Rock Island and on Monday morning was placed in the fair grounds.

COMMISSIONER ALLEN, of the Oregon Board of Immigration, is in charge of the car and is very assiduous in giving all information that can be desired.

THE CAR is a seventy foot Oregon Short Line car, the sides being decorated with a magnificent exhibit of the products of Oregon, and some from Washington Territory. The exhibit is arranged in such a manner that all can see it in passing through the car—ample passage way being found in the center. What is it composed of? That is a hard question to answer. Many kinds of wheat, oats, rye and barley, of a quality never surpassed before; plums, prunes, apples, peaches, and everything of that sort in endless variety, and in size and quality; vegetables that will satisfy all that there was no mistake made by the Iowa editors when they came home and spoke of the many wonderful things that were seen by them in roaming from one end of Oregon to the other.

The contents of that car stand as an undisputed fact that at least for once the Iowa editor did not enlarge upon the actual fact—if he did fair justice to the products that Oregon has."

Among the notices with which the car is decorated we note the following, which while sounding slightly boastful, yet are literally true: "Oregon is the home of more of earth's products than any other state in the Union. The climate and soil combine in bringing all products of the temperate zone to their highest state of perfection."

"Oregon fruits for size and quality, can not be surpassed. Come in and examine." "The climate of Oregon is unequalled by any other state in the Union."

"Oregon exhibits. This car contains an exhibit of the natural and agricultural products of nature's wonderland. All are invited inside the car. Come and be convinced."

"Oregon never fails to reward the laborer with abundant crops."

"Oregon on wheels. Out for a stroll among sister states. She cordially invites all who wish to return the visit, and they who long to dwell in the garden of the world to tarry with her and make themselves at home."

The cost of a special session need not necessarily be very heavy. The session would be short, or could be made so. To insinuate that the members would not do their duty in the premises, and adjourn as quickly as it was performed, is to charge them with not being conscientious men. The Governor nor his committee has the right to assume this by reason of the failures and blunders of the last session.
