England pays big salaries. The secretary of foreign affairs and first lord of the treasury gets \$50,000, the chancellor of the exchequer \$25,000, lord high chancellor \$50,000, lord lieutenant of Ireland \$100,000, lord president of privy home secretary \$25,000, secretary of war, \$25,000, secretary of India \$25,000 first lord of the admirality \$22,500, lord chancellor of Ireland \$30,000.

Let it be kept before the people that this administration has not paid off a dollar of the public debt nor taken a single step toward formulating any plans for the relief of depressed or the encouragement of a single manufacturing establishment. It has through the workings of republican laws collected to the aggregate of over three hundred and fifty million dollars but there it ended. It has not followed republican plans of paying the interest bearing bonds and thus affording real relief. During the campaigne they were going to divide out the greenback reserve. Why dont they pay out what the laws requires them to do any way?
