SUICIDE.—At an early hour on Wednesday morning the people of Jacksonville were greatly shocked by the news that James Lawrence had committed suicide by shooting himself in the head with a pistol. He occupied a room in John Orth's brick, and W. Drews who occupied the adjoining room, was the first to discover that something was wrong by the blood running under the door of his room. The door was broken open and upon his bed on the floor he was found in a dying condition, with the blood oozing from a ghastly wound in his head, back of the right ear. It was evidently a deliberate suicide as one cap had snapped and the pistol, a Smith & Wesson, was found with the other chambers filled. At the inquest the next day it was learned that his full name was James Lawrence Luckenbach, a native of Pennsylvania, and a cabinet-maker by trade, aged about 73 years, and that he had a wife and family living, having been separated from his wife; he came here in 1870 and has been employed by David Linn most of the time since. He was industrious, and pleasant in disposition, and now deceased, that he had any other name than the one he was known by, although he had many friends here. He has been in bad health for several years and had despaired of ever being cured, which, together with the disappointments of a life, that he held too sacred to reveal to even his most intimate friends, no doubt impelled him to the rash act of self destruction. Cheerful and pleasant to the last, his friends here never dreamed of the storm and tempest that had swept with such violence over him, that life had no longer any charm for him, and may be rest in peace in the loving hands of the One who has said: "peace be still" to all earthly storms and tempests. He was a Mexican war veteran, and had lately drawn a land warrant in Texas for his services in the Mexican war. A goodly concourse of friends followed his remains to their last resting place in the Jacksonville cemetery.

Something new in the way of entertainments will be given at the Presbyterian Church next Tuesday evening. A Pink Tea is promised by the Ladies Mite Society. Admittance 50 cents, Children half price, and an excellent time is promised. Doors open at 8 o'clock.

We have got our Winter wood pile started and any one wishing to "borrow" would do well to call on us first to see which of the sticks are loaded. The printer always gets small enough measure anyhow, and then to rob him of that the guilty parties deserve going to Sheol.

While out on a round through the valley buying wool George M. Willard, Mayor of Ashland, dropped in on us last evening and informed us that it was more wool that he wanted. He is paying the highest cash price and our sheep men will do well by remembering this.

Three more horses arrived here Thursday from Oregon Star Fair, comprising the well known runner Jim Lick, also Mountain Bell, claimed to be the fastest half mile runner on the coast, and horse called Digger, the champion 600 yards runner.—Yreka "Journal."

General Gibbons, after inspecting Fort Klamath returned over the Rogue River route and took the train for the north at Gold Hill Thursday night. Capt. Fowler of Fort Klamath accompanied him and spent yesterday in town. Dick Ish brought them over in a government ambulance.

It is generally believed that the Fair to be held at Yreka next week will be the best ever held in that place. Liberal purses are offered for the races and a large number of noted flyers from all parts of the coast will be there to compete for them. The attendance promises to be large.

The case of John F. Miller vs. James Tablin over some swamp land in Klamath county, is being argued before Judge Webster in chambers this week. Col. N. B. Knight of Salem, and Judges Prim and Hanna appear for plaintiff while Judge E. B. Watson and B. F. Dowell ate for the defense.

Our friend Brooks did not get lost in the mountains as reported last week but reports having found a good paying quartz ledge while away. His good luck in that line has induced him to reduce the price of drugs and jewelry at his store and he only asks patrons to price his goods so that he can show the proof.

The following are the mail routes advertised to be let from July 1, 1886 to June 30th 1890: To Medford and return, seven times a week; by Applegate and Murphy to Willamette, and return, twice a week; by Uniontown to Wright's and return, once a week; to Willow Springs and return, six times a week.

A horse was struck and killed by the engine of the passenger train in the wagon road between the Myer and Billings places Wednesday morning. The horse evidently stepped up on the track just as the engine began to cross the road, and was hidden by the banks of the cut and the fence at that point.—"Tidings."

New discoveries are constantly being made in the quartz lodes of this section. The rock from the newly discovered ledge at Galice Creek is undoubtedly a bonanza. The result of the recent annual state fair is anything but discouraging, notwithstanding the loss sustained by reason of Thursday's severe rain storm. The board of directors, it is claimed, will not only be able to pay off this year's premiums in full, but they will also have balance left of some \$7000 to apply toward paying for the indebtedness of the old association.

In the minds of some, our quartz mill prospects do not look as bright as they did a short time since. If Mr. Brown of Portland is not in earnest he should not have said what he did and our citizens would have carried out their project for getting a mill by popular subscription. The case is not hopeless yet, however, and we expect Mr. Brown will do all he promised to.

Edw. C. Robinson, a prominent attorney of Oakland, California, and a former resident of this place, has been visiting in Rogue River valley for the month past, returned to Oakland, yesterday. We like to see the young men of Jacksonville prospering and we know that he is, and has a brilliant future before him. He is the attorney for the public administrator of Alameda county and has all the business that he can attend to in that line and has a large practice outside of that. He was the attorney who prosecuted Jones for the murder of Lorenzo and succeeded in securing a verdict of murder in the first degree and the sentence is that the defendant hang as a just punishment for his crime.

The Jacksonville amateurs gave an entertainment in Ashland Friday of last week, under the auspices of the Silver Cornet Band. The interesting drama Comrades was presented and was greeted by a large audience. The scenery which had been prepared expressly for the occasion was fine, and each person who took part acquitted themselves creditably. Henry Pape's personation of the tramp, was pronounced a success, and in that character any of his friends might have met him on the road and "tossed" the fellow a quarter" without suspecting his identity. The amateur's band may go to Yreka during the fair, and if they do, we can assure our Yreka friends that their performance is well worth seeing.

We hear that the Siskiyou mountain tunnel is altogether too high in grade, and about half finished through the mountain, and that it is likely to be abandoned for a new tunnel. The road through Oregon is poorly constructed, especially between Roseburg and Ashland, so that it will be thoroughly overhauled no doubt as soon as leased by the Central Pacific, as the lease is a virtual purchase, extending over a period of 99 years. The object of the C. P. is to get a fast road to Portland, in order to compete with the Northern Pacific and Oregon Short Line, via their Central and Southern roads from the Eastern States, in securing the business of Oregon and Washington Territory, and the goods and merchandise shipped across the Pacific for transportation over the continent.—"Journal."

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Wm. Williams, a man well known in this county, fell off the embankment just below the Rock Point bridge last Sunday night while in an intoxicated condition and when found he was dead. Mr. Williams came to this coast in '49 from Kentucky, and located on Footh Creek in 1862 where he followed mining for a couple of years. He then removed to Birdsey creek and was a partner of J. A. Birdsey of this place in mining interests up to the time of his death. He was buried in the Footh creek cemetery and was about 66 years of age. The report of the Coroner's jury is as follows:

We, the jury, find that deceased's name is William Williams, and that he came to his death by accidentally falling over a precipice, he being in a state of intoxication.
