

The People's Choice.

The extra session of the Legislature that convened in Salem this week was called for the express purpose of electing a United States Senator, and we would again call the attention of the members of the Legislature to the fact that Hon. John H. Mitchell is the choice of a majority of the people of this State for that position. He has been for a quarter of a century a resident of this State, and for one term one of its most able and active representatives in the Senate, and is therefore well acquainted with the diversified needs of the State, and has proven that he does not represent sections or corporations, but every interest of the State at large.

His friends do not claim for him the prestige of speedily acquired wealth, for he is a poor man if measured by the standard of dollars and cents, but rich in every attribute that makes manhood honorable and influential. For years he has been assailed by every device to which jealous demagogues could resort, but he has passed through the fierce fires of their impotent rage unscathed, and to day stands like Saul of Tarsus, head and shoulders above every other candidate who has been named for the position. It wants a man who thoroughly comprehends the immediate necessities of Oregon, and who will know how to secure the sympathy and confidence of other Senators in relieving these necessities. It wants a man who will demand for the Columbia river a recognition commensurate with its greatness and commercial importance, and who will see to it that while millions upon millions of dollars are appropriated for the Mississippi river and Gulf harbors that the claims of the Columbia are not ignored. The "News" wants a man who, while he is a Republican, is not of the bigoted, narrow-contracted sort that refuse to recognize any virtue or any grace in a political opponent, but on the contrary is a man of catholic spirit whose constituents will be all the people of the State regardless of their occupations, professions or politics. The "News" especially wants a man who will do something to bridge the breach now separating Portland from the rest of the State—a chasm dug by the rapacity of Portland speculators and a selfish, bigoted and domineering newspaper, whose Ishmaelish hand is against every man, and every man's hand is against the city and community it so persistently misrepresents. The "News" wants a man elected whose friendships are trustworthy; whose energy and industry are proverbial; whose sympathies are as broad as the State; whose influence is national in its scope and character. The Seattle "Post-Intelligencer" discusses the Chinese question in the immediate vicinity of federal layettes, after this fashion: "The true way of expelling Chinese is, as it always has been, non-employment, non-intimidation. Persons who have discharged their Chinamen in deference to popular sentiment, need not re-employ them because the troops are here. Those who contemplated discharging their Chinamen, should not hesitate to do so now. So long as the anti-Chinese agitation is confined to endeavors to boycott the Chinamen, it is a good and a proper thing. Those who mean to keep within the law, have no reason to feel aggrieved because the law is strong. The employment of Chinese is to be deprecated as much to day as it was yesterday. Let that be borne in mind."

A party of U. S. troops have been sent to New Tacoma to preserve the peace. The grand jury of the judicial district has indicted thirty-two of the leaders in expelling the Chinamen, and trouble is only just in.

The "Call," in an editorial this morning referring to a matter under discussion by some Nevada papers, to annex Southern portions of Grant and Baker counties, Oregon, and Owyhee county, Idaho, in order to lighten her burden of taxation, says: "It is stated that large property holders in the Oregon counties favor annexation to Nevada. Public opinion in Owyhee county, Idaho, is also said to be favorable to the scheme. The fact that many of the property holders of these counties are residents of Nevada may account for this sentiment."

It will not require many years of southern solidarity, maintained by suppression of votes, to create Republican solidity in the north. The only way to avert the danger of such sectionalism is to give equal rights to all parties in all the states. This is the demand of the Republican party. It asks no wars, and will be content with no less.

It is now a dilemma that the authorities of the Catholic church have resolved to take a hand in the temperance cause. Should this great power really become aroused and exert itself in this cause more would be accomplished in a brief time than can ever be done by political agitation.

It is understood that there are as many as twenty-seven Democratic congressmen elected who have not yet prepared speeches in opposition to civil service reform.

Yesterday we received a pleasant call from Willie Dunnaway of Portland, one of the proprietors of the "New Northwest." This is his first visit to Southern Oregon and he expresses himself more than pleased with the looks of the country.

A chimney in Judge Duncan's house burning out last Wednesday night caused an alarm of fire but the engine was not taken out as it was not required. An alarm of fire makes our usually quiet streets present a lively appearance on short notice.

Stoneman has offered \$500 reward for the arrest of the murderer of John Sherman, who was killed near Dry Lake, in Modoc county last June, while on his way to Modoc from Siskiyou county, accompanied by his wife and a German named Randolph Korb, the latter having at about seriously wounded and crippled.

The party given at Central Point last Tuesday night was a grand success as usual everyone attending coming away well pleased. Excellent music was furnished by the Jacksonville string band and the supper furnished by Gus Delpy and wife is pronounced by those who attended from here to have been the finest they ever sat down to. Eight or ten couples from here were present and all declare their willingness to go back again whenever another ball is announced.

Concerning the tramps arrested for the murder at Roseburg, reported two weeks ago, a correspondent writes as follows to the "Oregonian": "Mike, one of the tramps jointly indicted with two others whose true names could not be learned, and who could not be found, for the murder of the tramp Sullivan about two weeks ago, was tried last week. The first jury disagreed, standing three for murder in the first degree, two for manslaughter and seven for acquittal. The jury on the second trial found a verdict of 'not guilty,' whereupon he, with three others who had been held as witnesses were discharged. Two of them found their way Saturday morning into the recorder's court, who gave them five days in the cooler for drunkenness."
