Mitchell's Friends.

The friends of Hon. John H. Mitchell have not seen proper, to assail the character or reputation of any of the gentlemen named in connection with the position of United States Senator. They have no desire to do so, for they recognize in such methods no advantage to the party or honor to the State. But they will not be bulldozed or intimidated by insinuations or threats. At least they so state most emphatically. Those who have known him most intimately and longest seem to be his most earnest admirers and ardent adherents. They affirm, with little show of contradiction, that he was the most active, the most liberal and the most successful Senator Oregon ever had in Washington; that he did not use his position to increase his personal wealth; that he did not prostitute his office as Senator for purposes of speculation; that he never neglected a duty he owed a constituent, regardless of the latter's politics; that he always had time, and indicated that it was a pleasure, to show attention to any of his constituents who chanced to visit the National Capital while he was Senator; that he was indefatigable and usually successful in securing for Oregon her full share of national appropriations; in short, that he is a man of the people, works for the people, and is recognized by the people as both a representative and a friend. This being the view entertained of him by his numerous friends, it is pretty certain that uncalculated and unprovoked slander and abuse will only make them stand by him more courageously and devotedly, while at the same time it will bring down their indignation and wrath upon his defamers, those who associate with and encourage them, and those who expect to derive any personal or political advantage from the defamations.
