RELIGIOUS ITEMS—Rev. J. R. Roberts will preach at Phoenix next Sunday. Elder M. Peterson preaches at Medford Sunday at the usual hour. Elder H. C. Fleming will preach at the Lone Oak school house next Sunday. Regular services will be held at the Catholic church in this place, Rev. F. X. Blanche officiating. Rev. W. P. Williams will hold services at the M. E. Church in this place next Sunday, both morning and evening. Elder M. Peterson will hold services at Phoenix one week from next Wednesday evening. His late meetings there were well attended. Rev. A. R. Bickenbach held services at Phoenix Sunday, at 11 o'clock a. m., and at the Presbyterian church in Jacksonville in the evening of the same day, when a Christmas praise meeting will be held.

OUR MINERAL RESOURCES—Every where prospecting for quartz is being prosecuted vigorously, and each day reveals an additional development of the most flattering character. The long anticipated boom for this country is evidently at hand, and the capital that has been so slow to yield to the urgent demands of the time is tending either, and the latest and most improved method will be utilized in the development of our illimitable and as yet undeveloped mineral resources. The interest that has been dormant during the time that our people were so intensely interested in railroad building is again fully aroused, and the future of this country was never brighter or more promising. The machinery for an amalgamator and concentrator is to be shortly set to work in Jacksonville, and on the way and contracts have been let for an immense amount of quartz from the various ledges in this part of the valley to be at hand with which to begin operations. In the quartz mining that has been done here in years past, only a small per cent. of free gold was saved, but with the improved methods for reducing the concentrations, the results will undoubtedly exceed the most sanguine expectations. In a conversation with Mr. George F. Dyer, one of the gentlemen who is interested in the building of the new mill, and who has been for many years past actively engaged in the vast gold fields of Montana, Nevada, Idaho and California, ascertained that the quartz mines of this part of the State would surpass in richness those of either of those States and Territories, and the fact that those men are backing their opinions by investing in the mines and also the necessary machinery for their development is proof positive that they know whereof they speak. Now is the golden opportunity for the investment of capital and also for the prospecting of the numless leads of gold bearing quartz that abound in this vicinity.

CHRISTMAS—Yesterday was the Christmas anniversary, and seldom has the day passed off more pleasantly or been marked by more genuine good will or generous hospitality. For many months past this part of the State has enjoyed entire immunity from disease, and while all are profoundly grateful for the blessings of the past, they seemed intent on the healthful enjoyment of the present. OREGON AND CALIFORNIA RATES—It is learned by inquiry at the office of the Oregon & California railroad company that the notice recently published providing for the discontinuance on January 3, 1886, of certain tariff rates and special rates was given merely for the purpose of placing the company in position to maintain its right to charge the maximum tariff rate as allowed under the Hoult act. Railroad companies are required under this act to post schedules of rates on the first Monday of January and July in each year, which shall be the maximum rates for the ensuing six months. These rates must, however, not be higher than the tariffs which were in force on January 1, 1885. Accordingly a schedule of rates will be posted on January 4, 1886, identical with that in force on January 1, 1885, but it is not contemplated at present to go back to those schedules, which, in many cases, show materially higher rates than now in force. The company does not intend at present to increase the rates now in force, and will resume present schedules and most of the present special rates, including those for grain, as soon as the formality deemed necessary under the law is completed with. The revenue will be made up so as not to cause inconvenience to shippers at any special rates which expire on January 3, may not be renewed and shippers will therefore do well to make inquiry of the station agents at the proper time.—"Oregonian."
