SUICIDE AT CHICO.—Chico, Cal., January 2.—A man aged about 60 years, named Preston D. Anderson, committed suicide here on Thursday by taking arsenic. Help being slow in coming, he suffered until 9 p. m. of that day and expired. An acquaintance of Anderson says that the family of deceased lives in Jackson county, Oregon, and he has one brother there highly respected. Anderson had a wife and grown-up daughter in Oregon, and on account of domestic troubles left them a short time ago and came to Chico. He was destitute.

Regular term of Circuit Court commences again on Monday next. The docket is not as large as it has been of late.

Papers all over Oregon, regardless of party, are condemning the recent abridgement of mail facilities in the State.

Rev. A. H. Sunderman intends opening a German school here soon and is already assured of a liberal patronage.

W. J. Plymale went to Portland last Sunday night accompanied by his daughter Kate, who will attend school there for a time.

Ashland Odd Fellows will have a supper and sociable at their installation on the 16th and a number from here will likely attend.

At the New Year's Masquerade held here a kindly feeling was shown by all our neighbors as they attended in good numbers.

Several summonses have been running in the Salem station, all of them wanting a man named E. J. Dawne to come forward and settle up.

From the Sexton's report as published elsewhere it will be seen that only eleven deaths occurred in Jacksonville during 1885.

It is our opinion that the road between here and Medford is the worst in Oregon—in fact some portions of the new road cannot be traveled at all.

Mrs. E. Kuny entertained a large number of guests at a dinner party given in honor of Mr. and Mrs. G. V. Johnson of Roseburg, on Wednesday last.

L. D. Montgomery is now in charge of the Grand Applegate mines as Receiver until the Chinamen sell the purchase price. J. N. Castelle is foreman of the work.

J. R. Little has gone to Roseburg on a visit. As the Indian war veterans' meet in a few days we suppose he has gone there to represent Jacksonville in that body.

The \$100 raffish at Riley's saloon resulted in J. G. Birdsey winning the \$75 prize while John A. Hanley and Wm. Bybee, Jr. tied for the \$25 and then made a division.

We were mistaken in stating that the Rogue River Distillery had resumed work. It will probably take them a month or more before the papers can be arranged.

The net receipts of the Jacksonville post-office during the past fiscal year were \$706.10 and those of Ashland during the same time were \$685.97, and of Roseburg \$586.50.

A mortgage wherein B. F. Dowell is defendant was foreclosed at Portland this week. Governor Moody appearing as plaintiff, the money having been borrowed from the school fund of the State.

A Portland boy charges Quimby, of the Quimby house, and several employees, with offering him \$5.00 to burn the Intermation Hotel. Several arrests have been made, but all but the boy have been discharged.

The fruit growers of Oregon will hold a meeting in Portland on the 8th inst. similar to the one held in San Francisco about a month ago. A permanent organization is expected to be formed and if the fruit growers reap as much benefit from this meeting as the California association will probably reap from their meeting, the time will be well spent.

A French astronomer has ascertained that the earth and planets were made first, and then the sun and moon was hung up as a sort of experiment. They pleased so well that they were left hanging.

The third annual mask ball of the Jacksonville Silver Cornet Band will be held on Friday, Feb. 12th. It will no doubt be grand affair, as no pains will be spared to make it such. See their advertisement next week.

An assignee's sale of the property belonging to Baruch Fisher will be held at the store in Woodville January 16th, when it can be purchased in bulk or in quantities to suit. N. Fisher, assignee will superintend the sale.

At the Medford town election held on Monday last 125 votes were cast and the following candidates elected: Trustees, Dr. Geary, G. W. Howard, F. Galloway, A. Childers, J. S. Howard; recorder, G. S. Walton; marshal, I. Wolf; treasurer, Chas. Strang; street commissioner, E. G. Hart.

Mitchell says he is under no obligation to the Northern Pacific Railroad company, and that he is in favor of forfeiting the grant from Wallula to Portland. He has not yet made up his mind as to the Cascade division, and will probably favor extending more time to the Oregon and California road.

Saturday the Northern Pacific railroad company put into effect reduced rates on first class limited tickets to all points east, in accordance with a resolution passed at the last transcontinental meeting. The rate to St. Paul is \$84, instead of \$95; to Chicago \$95, instead of \$103 50; to New York \$112, instead of \$126 75.

The two Oakland confidence men have been captured. They were caught on the freight train bound south at Riddle's and were taken to Oakland where they waived examination, and were bound over in \$500 each. On their persons were found \$76.50 of the missing money. They gave their names as John Lyons and R. Riley.

Hon. Binger Heermann writes to Wm. Steel, of Portland, that several prominent people at Washington have taken an interest in the project of having Crater lake set aside as a national park, and that he has enlisted Prof. Dillon of the United States geological survey, who is acquainted with the Crater lake country, who will do all he can to aid the scheme.

There is a rumor afloat in this city—on what foundation is not known—that the railroad company intend changing their time soon, making the night passenger run on this end of the road. The new time card, it is said, would bring the mail train from Portland to Salem at 11 p. m., and the north-bound at 2 a. m. The Lebanon express would then pass south at 5 p. m., and north at 8 a. m.—Salem "Statesman."

Mr. G. A. Hubbell of this place received a letter from Oregon City inquiring about the mine and what chance there was to get employment out here. Thinking his correspondent to be a middle aged working man he answered it and in reply received the following letter which we give for the benefit of the boys.

MR. HUBBELL—DEAR SIR:—I thank you for your kind letter, and will tell you why I inquired about mining. I am a little boy 13 years old and live with my grandmother and I cannot do much to earn money to help her. My little brother 11 years old lives with us and this is what I thought: If I could put a few dollars in a mine I might help grandmother to take care of brother and me. We are very poor; please let me know if there are any places where I can make anything, and please tell me how much money is the least I would have to put in a mine. I don't know hardly how to tell you what I want, but I think you will understand that what I want is to help grandmother who is very poor and has to take care of brother and me. She is most 60 years old and has poor health. Is there any thing boys can do in Jacksonville to earn money or is there any one there who would like to take a boy as his own, please let me know by return mail. I want to learn a trade if I can, and if you can help me any, being we have never met, but hope we shall meet if you are a friend to the friendless, and please tell me if you are a Christian, for all Gods people are friends to his poor; please forgive me if I have stepped on forbidden ground, but that is the way grandmas says, if a man is a Christian he ain't afraid to trust him. Hoping to hear from you soon I remain your humble servant.

THE PENITENTIARY.—There were confined in the penitentiary on the 31st of December, 1884, 274 convicts. During 1885, 128 were received, making a total under confinement during the year of 412. There were 118 discharged, one died, and one was sent to the asylum. There now remain 292 in the penitentiary.

Co. Commissioners' Court.

The following is a synopsis of this court's proceedings up to the time the SENTINEL went to press:

The consideration of the review of the Camp Stewart and Butte creek road was postponed until next term. The bids for graveling of the Tice lane were rejected and the matter postponed indefinitely.

G. W. Dunn was granted the vacant State University scholarship.

The authorities of Jacksonville were allowed to remove certain records from the Clerk's office concerning said town. Judges and Clerks of election for the ensuing two years were appointed. Several road supervisors made their reports, and new supervisors were appointed in most districts.

The petition for the division of Applegate road, district No. 19 and for the establishment of a new district was granted.

In the matter of a new road on Evans creek, Jas. Jeffrey appointed surveyor and Chas. Williams, I. Simpkins and A. K. Williams viewers.

E. B. Canton and Robt. Westrop were granted the right to sell liquor at Central Point.

Boundary lines of Salt creek and Clatskanie road districts were established.

J. F. Davis was appointed constable of Little Butte precinct, vice E. F. Simon resigned.

In the matter of the change in the Pelican bay and Antelope creek road. Continued.

The road leading to the new Rogue river bridge, heretofore surveyed and laid out, was ordered established.

The viewers in the matter of the Rogue river bridge road allowing Wm. Bybee \$650 damages, their report was ratified.

It was ordered that the bills of all such road supervisors who do not submit their reports at the next term of this court will be disallowed.

The annual apportionment of taxes was made, to-wit: For State tax, 4 mills and 7-10 mills; school tax, 4 mills; county purposes, 12 and 3-10 mills.

Of this number 13 were over fifty years of age; 13 were over twenty and under fifty, 13 were under twenty and one age not stated. Of this number 11 belonged in this place, six were from the hospital, four from Applegate, four from Medford, four from Willow Springs, three from Butte creek, two from over Rogue river and one each from Ish's ranch, Sterling, Slicky, Griffin creek, Evans creek and one stranger passing through.
