Honest Congressman.

A bill has introduced a bill in Congress to require members of that body to take an oath that they have not in any way bought their way there. The oath can be much more specified than it is expressed in the bill. It should be amended to say all that is possible to cover the question of corruption and bribery, and then should be forced to an issue. The people would like to see what members will do with such a bill. At present the world believes that elections of Congressmen and Senators are secured by corrupt means in a majority of cases. The most important thing to be secured in this country at this time is good and honest legislation. This never can come from corrupt men and the man is corrupt who secures his seat in Congress by the use of money or promise of place or any increment of the sort. It is only honest to submit one's claims to the people and abide the result. "Our liberty" is worth little if we are to be governed by men who buy offices. "Popular government" is a base fraud if it means that those who have votes shall sell them to the highest bidder. "Freedom" is not so respectable as despotism if citizens are so base as to barter their suffrage for selfish ends. We had best begin again with another "revolutionary war" if Congressmen are all corrupt. The list of grievances will be long enough to warrant it - Wabamette, "Farmer."

A New York dispatch of the 4th inst. had the following: "Jacob Thoman, an old actor, died at the Forest Home for actors on Tuesday. His body was shipped to Lancaster to be cremated, according to his expressed wish. He was the support of Forest and the elder Booth frequently on the Pacific coast." Thoman brought the first theatrical troupe that ever played to an Oregon audience. It was in 1836, and the troupe consisted of three men and two women; Lizzie Gordon, who afterward married Charles Stewart, a Portland saloon keeper, being the star. They droye overland from California, and played at all the principal towns, including Salem, Oregon City and Portland. Their entertainment opened with a comedy, then Miss Gordon presented some features of the terpsichorean art, and the show concluded with a farce. Many oldtimers will remember the advent of the theatre, as it created quite a furore here at the time.

A Representative Body.

The Anti-Chinese Congress that will assemble in this city on the 13th inst., will be a meeting of the representative men of the Pacific Northwest. Two Councilmen of this city are delegates to the Convention, both of them from different organizations. Puget Sound will send nine men whose names have been identical with the prosperity and development of that country for many years past. In fact every labor organization, Turn Verein, secret and non-secret society in the North-west will send delegates who have been previously instructed how to cast their votes. The effect of the convention can only be surmised. However, the chances seem good that within twenty-four hours after adjournment John Chinaman will know that he is no longer wanted in Portland, and within sixty days he will have entirely disappeared, and the Congress will not pay his transportation either. No violence will be used. All organizations that have not yet selected delegates should do so at once. Only a few days intervene. - "News."

For some time past the inmates of the county jail have been disturbed in their slumbers by most unearthly sounds apparently coming from around and about the cells. From men who have returned from the line of the narrow gauge railroad we learn that the Chinese have not been discharged. On the contrary, their number has been increased by at least 80 more during the past two or three weeks, and there are now about 150 Chinese working on the line and but 60 white men. We are not surprised at this news, for we never had the slightest confidence in the oily-tongued alien money-lender who has management of that road. His excuse, we suppose, is that he cannot get white men to work at his munificent wages of \$1.25 per day without board. But this is not the case, for we have seen several men who have been there and report that they were unable to procure work even at such meager wages.

Signs of Spring. - Spring is coming and for the last ten days it almost seemed as if the rattle of her robes could be heard among the branches of the lilac bushes, the buds on which are swelling and showing signs of expanding into leaves. Last evening, however, she seemed to have retreated before the wind and heavy rain. However, she has left signs of advent, as in the gardens around town crocuses, snowdrops, daisies, violets and pansies are blooming and daffodils, tulips and other early flowers are making vigorous growth. - "Oregonian."

A. G. Biedsol, of Eureka, California, an attorney and a member of the Citizens' Committee at Eureka, who arrived at San Francisco recently, says that Eureka has gained by the expulsion of Chinese. The new steam laundry employs about 100 white men and women. There are about sixty Chinese persons remaining in Humboldt county. Recently a Chinese highbinder appeared at Eureka, trying to lease land for Chinamen. He was informed that he must leave Eureka, and was escorted to the steamer and returned to San Francisco.

The track on the California & Oregon railroad extension is said to be laid to within two miles of Portuguese Flat, and within a few days that place will be the general headquarters for most of the force grading between there and tunnel 10, which is two miles south of Suther's. Work continues to be pushed nowwithstanding the stormy weather.
