That Exhibit.

Our democratic friends are evidently becoming alarmed at the outspoken dissatisfaction which can be heard throughout the county against the present methods of conducting county affairs. So great was this alarm in this direction that they deemed it advisable to make what they call a "Semi-annual Exhibit," in order that they may quiet the troubled mind. There is no good reason for this exhibit, and at the same time admit that it is not correct. If such is the case then why give a statement at all. The fact was it was given to influence the voters at the approaching election and if possible continue the same clique in power. We will call the attention of the voters to this exhibit and we believe we can show conclusively that it was got up to deceive and mislead, instead of giving the true financial condition of the county. The whole amount of liabilities as per exhibit up to January 1, 1886, \$91,534.83. From this he deducts assets, \$35,515.29.

But indebtedness to Jan 1 1886, \$55,319.54. The question is where does he get those assets, let him answer? "The assets consists of cash and cancelled warrants in treasury and county assessment levy." You will perceive that he takes the whole assessment levy and amounts due from all other sources to make his \$35,515.29. Now if the whole assets of the county from all sources were applied to the reduction of the county debt as the exhibit has it, we would respectfully ask where the money is to come from to pay the county expenses until another levy is made. Again if the expenses of the county continue as it has for the last two years, it will require the whole amount of assets to pay these expenses and more. Therefore the county indebtedness would increase instead of decrease as they would have you believe. Again how do the people know that he has these assets. He simply informs the people that they consist of cash and warrants in treasury and assessment levy. When an exhibit is made the people expect it in detail giving the exact amount of each kind of assets mentioned instead of lumping the whole and deducting it from the indebtedness in order to make a good showing. A school boy could detect such deception. Again there are outstanding warrants amounting to about \$68,000, upon which a large amount of interest has accrued amounting to many thousands of dollars. This should be added to the \$91,534.83 which would swell the amount to near where we placed the indebtedness a few weeks ago, "near 100,000." We have now exposed this foolish attempt to deceive the people, we therefore place the whole matter in their hands, and it is for them to say whether a change should be made in order that an exhibit be made showing the whole indebtedness and the assets to pay the same. Republicans have nothing to say, they can only assist the honest portion of the democracy of the county to elect such as will look more to the interest of the county than their own pockets. We will have more to say about this matter.

We want to say a few words to the young men; and especially to those young men who will soon cast their first ballot, we say to you: Don't become a republican because we are, nor a democrat because we are. Do your own thinking if you don't, you will be somebody's property. Some one will own you. Being young is your great privilege. To be independent, to come to your own conclusion, by the use of your own thinker is a greater privilege. Many men admire the form of our government only. But be it yours, to be sure and drink at the spring, at the fountains head. Be sure you imbibe the spirit of our government. See here: No state, no nation, no country, and no man can become truly great without some patriotism. That is all.

Commissioner Sparks is reported to have said that on all the timber land entries in California not less than 5 per cent have been honest and legitimate. The Land Office holds ready to be canceled fully 95 per cent of timber land entries of the Pacific Coast.

Senator Mitchell's Proposition.

Senator Mitchell has introduced a bill in the senate to abrogate all treaties which give the Chinese the right to enter this country and then effectually exclude them. There is not much doubt says the "Bulletin," but that is a step which will have to be taken sooner or later. The movement against the coolies which is now so general throughout the Pacific coast goes by different names. As a matter of fact it is merely a popular effort more determined than anything that has yet been attempted to shake off Mongolianism. Its object is nothing more than the full and complete re-Americanization of the Pacific states and territories which are about the only areas not well filled up in the United States at this time. It might as well be understood by all those who gave any thought to the subject, east or west, that this movement is not going to come to a halt, or that there is going to be a reaction of any consequence. The conflict is as irrepressible as that between free and slave labor formerly in the south. It will proceed until the only logical solution possible under the circumstances is reached—that is to say, the absolute, complete and eternal exclusion of the servile and disturbing Chinese element. If there is not legislation wise and broad to facilitate and guide the movement, it will, before long, assume another and less manageable form.

To Senator Mitchell's proposition, therefore, congress will in time have to come. No doubt the wisest thing to do is to accept and enforce it now. But whether congress and the country are educated up to that point is the serious question of the discussion. If there is any chance for its passage and approval by the president, all would at once say, that is the bill for the Pacific coast.

The die is cast. The "Times" editor has placed himself upon the record as opposed to the admission of Dakota and Washington territories, giving the most brilliant and satisfactory reason that could be presented to the ordinary democratic mind. The night objection is that those territories if admitted will be republican states and therefore should not be admitted. The argument is a clincher and we shrink from attempting to answer a reason so statesmanlike and so profoundly democratic. It is an act of down-right impudence to ask admission under a democratic administration.

Since writing the above we learn that the objection has been removed by the people of those territories pledging themselves to vote the democratic ticket.

Prohibition State Convention.
The state convention of the prohibition party of Oregon will be held at Salem Wednesday, March 31. Primaries will be held Saturday, March 20 and county conventions Thursday, March 25. Following is the state apportionment: Baker, 4; Benton, 8; Clackamas, 6; Clatsop, 4; Coos, 4; Crook, 2; Curry, 1; Douglas, 8; Gilliam, 3; Jackson, 8; Josephine, 2; Klamath, 1; Lake, 1; Lane, 8; Linn, 9; Morrow, 12; Marion, 12; Multnomah, 19; Polk, 6; Tillamook, 1; Union, 5; Washington, 6; Wasco, 7; Grant, 3.

The New York "Tribune" in a recent article commenting upon the Oregon Pacific Railroad presents some figures showing that this line, connected with the route surveyed for the western extension of the Chicago and Northwestern would, when completed, form a line from ocean to ocean, by far the shortest across the continent, and one upon which trains would run from Albany, Oregon, to Philadelphia or New York several hours quicker than by any other route. That a large amount of railroad construction is to be done in the west this year is conceded. Surveyors from the east pushing west, and that the Oregon Pacific will push eastward at an early day to meet them is no longer a matter of doubt.

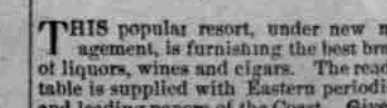
