THE HUMORS OF WAR.—The University Cadets at Seattle were on active service during the recent riot in that place, and were deeply in earnest, as the following will show. On the evening the regular troops from Vancouver arrived, the city being under martial law, three of the officers, Messrs. Wiser, Cabell and Hasbrouck started out to go to headquarters to procure passports. At the first corner a cadre presented arms and ordered them to halt, with the customary question, "Friends or foes?" "Friends and regular army officers," replied one. "Give the countersign," from the young sentry. "We are on our way to headquarters for," they answered. The sentry commanded "Right about face, march gentlemen; I am sorry, but I don't know who you are." And the three officers were forthwith marched back to their quarters at the point of the bayonet by the gallant young sentry, a boy of 16.

A refreshment stand at a point somewhere near Shively gulch could have done a thriving business this week. There has been a constant travel passing that way for about ten days past.

The fine weather of the past week has dried up water and compelled many of our miners to suspend work. If this kind of weather does not last too long, however, most any little rain will start them all up again.

We have wondered for some time why you didn't get the Postoffice Tony, but this explanation is satisfactory.

The owners of the New Eldorado on Armstrong gulch are utilizing the water from Beckman's ditch above and are slicing off the top dirt covering their ledge. A good prospect is found there both in the gravel and in the rock.

C. D. Faling is train dispatcher for the O. & C. R. R. Co. no more and is reported to have left Portland with a good supply of funds belonging to his wife. Another woman living in this county is said to be the cause of his downfall.

The authors of those counterfeit dollars circulated in Portland have been captured. Their names are Freeman, Blagg and Eberhage. They had been doing their work in a cabin near Kalama, where a complete outfit was found.

The new firm in the silver ledge near Shively gulch in which Chas. Kearns was formerly interested is now composed of L. D. Brown, Henry Kippel, W. T. Moore and Ed. Fegan. The new firm are continuing the work right along.

A number of the old-time friends and relatives of Mrs. Ulrich met at the residence of Thos. J. Kenney last Wednesday night to congratulate her on having reached her 56th birthday. We join in wishing her many more years of health and happiness.

Wm. Huggins now assists J. N. Casteel in the Timber Gulch tunnel and both being workers they make good headway each day. It will probably take until the first of May before the 195 feet are run to tap the ledge for which the company is looking for.

In our humble opinion we think Judge Prim ought to feel highly flattered with the explanation the "Times" of last week gives him (Prim) in regard to the dates of his connection with the railroad company as attorney. If a democrat must be elected we are now in favor of Mr. Cogswell.

A text case to decide whether the Circuit Judges elected last election would hold for two or six years has been made in Douglas county and Judge Bean holds that their terms expire next July. The case has been appealed to the Supreme Court and the matter will probably be decided before the election.

Preparations are already in progress for the execution of O'Neil, he having less than two weeks more to live. The hanging will be as private as possible and the gallows will be enclosed with a high board fence. The prisoner still declares his innocence and believes that he will at least escape the penalty of death by hanging.

Hon. John Myers presided at the late "congress" which resolved that the Chinese must go by the 22nd of March and resolved further to boycott the "Oregonian" and "Telegram." It must have been that word "congress" which induced this horny handed son of toil to thus associate himself. He has long been anxious to go to college.

Genl. Thos. G. Roames, Grand Master of the Masonic order in this State, has just returned from an extended official visit to the lodges in the northern end of the State. He has instituted new lodges while away, dedicated halls and paid friendly visits to established lodges and from his present looks we would judge that he had been quite well fed on the trip.

A Smith River correspondent of the Del Norte "Record" says: Pat. McMahon, from Jacksonville, was here last Saturday and made arrangements with C. Trefethen to carry the mail from Rockland to Crescent City until the end of his contract. Trefethen will run his stage from Crescent City to Rockland with mail and passengers, so that all who wish to go to Southern Oregon can rely upon a good conveyance through.

A mechanic from Portland arrived here yesterday morning to superintend the setting up of the quartz mill here. The building is up and good progress is being made in getting the machinery in place and it will now be only a few days till the work of crushing rock will begin. The first run will be made on rock taken from Grob & Braamlied's ledge on Jackson creek and they have already hauled nearly ten tons at this time.

The Port Orford correspondent of the Gold Beach "Gazette" says one of the earliest settlers there states that the present winter is not surpassed by the noted winter of 1881-2, when, between November 15 and April 1, the rainfall was 67 inches. The strong northwest winds set in about the middle of April and blew the whole summer of 1882. The "Gazette" weather sharp at Port Orford anticipates the same thing next summer.

One day last week an Ashland man who had been prospecting told his friends that he had struck a good lead, clear and well defined. It wasn't gold or silver, however, but a valuable mineral that has not been hitherto discovered in this region. Upon being pressed for further information he finally said it was a clear, clean lead of "unbaga." He will probably find it difficult to prevail upon anyone else to take an interest with him in that mine.—"Tidings."

This is a good time to take a flying visit to the East, as the war between the transcontinental lines has reduced the rates to something like a reasonable amount. The only drawback is that after cutting each other's throats for two or three months the roads will decide that it is better to sacrifice the dear public, and the old rates will be restored. It is too early yet to expect a permanent reduction, but this war of rates between competing lines is a sign of what is coming in the near future.

The interest on the county debt now outstanding in scrip, says the "Tidings" must amount to over \$7,000 a year, and to meet this it requires the income from the twenty mill tax on about \$373,000 of the assessed property valuation of the county. But out of this big, twenty mill tax only twelve and three tenths mills are applicable to "county purposes," the other being set aside for state and school purposes, hence the tax from about \$575,000 of the county property is required to meet the interest upon the big debt at 8 per cent.

The new edition of school laws ordered by the legislature at the special session has been compiled, printed and is now being distributed to the several counties. This edition of the laws will afford one copy to each school district in the state, and a sufficient number will at once be sent to each county superintendent to supply each school clerk with one copy for the use of the district. This edition contains the amendments made at the special session, and in addition to this, all of the decisions rendered by the superintendent of public instruction since July 1, 1885.

The election for town officers will be held on Tuesday next but as there is no contest for any of the offices little interest is taken and a light vote can be looked for. Usually there is great strife between several candidates for the office of Marshal, but as Mr. Curtis has filled this office so acceptably to all no one has appeared to run against him and he will have a walk-over. For the office of Recorder we have heard of two candidates, G. A. Hubbell and the present incumbent, J. H. Huffer, but as the perquisites of that office are so small we don't expect much of a fight there. For the office of Trustee it seems to be hard to find five men willing to take the place.

Questioned as to the number of Chinese now in the country, state and city, Consul Bee made answer that his estimates were as follows: That there are 30,000 fewer Chinese in the country now than there were at the time the Restriction Act was passed, "but since 1883 an annual average of 1,200 old and sick Chinese have been assisted home; that the number of Chinese in the United States is 85,000; that there are about 75,000 on the coast, that total being made up of 65,000 in California, 3,000 in Washington, and 7,000 in Oregon; finally, that there are at present in San Francisco just about 19,500 Chinese residents and 15,000 fiscal transients.—San Francisco "Chronicle."

A SINGULAR COMPROMISE.—An Ashland man loaned one of his horses to his son. The latter, who has a weak knee for the ardent, went on a spree and "swapped horses" with a livery man down the valley, taking \$300. He then played cards with the livery man and his partner and lost the thirty dollars. The father stepped in and replenished the animal, and the case came up in Justice Eubank's court in Ashland. Just how it would have terminated if left to the lawyers and courts, is a matter of conjecture, for the case was settled upon a novel plan. The father of the erring son proposed that if his son and the two livery men would obligate themselves by oath before the court not to touch alcoholic liquor of any kind for one year he would pay half the costs and have the case dismissed, the livery men to keep the animal. This was agreed upon; the three men each took the oath and the case ended—no to the great disgust of the lawyers. How secretly the men will regard this oath taken under all the forms of the law, remains to be seen.—"Tidings."

DAVE CARRICK PARDONED.—The Prison Commission at their last meeting, on hearing petitions of the friends of parties imprisoned, including David Carrick, who was sentenced for life from this county, on conviction for the murder of a man named Scott, in view of his injuries received from an insane Chinese convict, and his advanced age. Ex-Congressman J. K. Luttrell interceded in his behalf, claiming innocence of the deed by evidence obtained since his conviction, backed by petition asking clemency, and the efforts of his son James, who is entitled to great credit for the affection shown and interest taken in behalf of his aged father. On this recommendation, the Governor issued a pardon for Mr. Carrick's release, but it may be some time before he can return to Skikyou, as he has not recovered from his injuries, which will cripple him for life.—Yreka "Journal."
