Republican State Convention

A Republican Convention for the State of Oregon is called to meet at Portland, Oregon, on Wednesday, April 28, 1886, at 11 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices, to-wit: Representative in Congress, Judge of the Supreme Court, Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Superintendent of Public Instruction, State Printer and district officers of the several judicial districts; and to transact such other business as may properly come before the Convention...

The committee recommend that the primaries be held in the several precincts on Tuesday, April 6th, and the county conventions on Friday, April 16th, 1886, unless otherwise ordered by the proper County Central Committee.

We learn that our remarks last week upon that exhibit, created quite a flutter among the faithful, as well as increasing the feelings among the tax payers that "reform" is needed in the management of county affairs. We cannot understand why they should fear to give to the tax payers a fair statement of the financial condition of the county instead of endeavoring to deceive the people by giving an exhibit such as the last, which is acknowledged to be incorrect, and therefore given to the public to mislead and deceive. Their heavy majority in this county would in all probability carry their ticket through without regard to any other consideration. Therefore, why fear an open manly statement of the whole county business. This is what the people want and expect. We know of no law requiring a semi-annual exhibit, and as the people made no demand for it, we can see no other reason than that it was given to have its effect upon the approaching election. In that they are correct, but the effect is not the kind they anticipated but just the opposite and may give our cotem much trouble to convince the dear people that it is all right.

President Cleveland in a long message to the Senate remarks: "I have said that certain officials should not in my opinion be removed during the continuance of the term for which they were appointed solely for the purpose of putting in their places those in political affiliation with the appointing of power, and this declaration was immediately followed by a description of the official PARTISANSHIP which did not entitle those in whom it was exhibited to consideration." What a long sentence it required to tell the U. S. Senate that offensive partisans are removed to make a place for inoffensive democrats and therefore the Senate has nothing to inquire into. Had the President informed the Senate at the start that persons removed before their terms expired had been removed for the above cause, no objection would have been urged against the confirmation of those appointed in their place.

The good results of the law passed by the last Legislature compelling the sheriff to receipt for the amount of scrip and cash paid for taxes separately, is beginning to be felt throughout the State and especially in this county. In former years it was almost impossible for tax payers to purchase county scrip to pay one half of their taxes, they therefore were compelled to pay in cash. Strange as it may appear, yet dame rumor has it that the scrip for the one half of the taxes reached the treasurer's office, "through ways that are dark and tricks that are vain." Now the change is remarkable. The tax payers can purchase all the scrip they want and at reasonable figures. The "Times" editor advertises for sale which is an unusual occurrence and is evidence of the good effect of the law in placing the scrip within the reach of the tax payers.

Representative Herrmann, of Oregon, after much labor, has secured the restoration of the mail service between Ashland and Linkville to six times a week; also the establishment of a service between Cleveland and Lookingglass, Oregon. Herrmann says if the people in the West, who were injured by having the service cut down, would petition for its restoration, it would probably be done.

The Registry Law.

The registration boards of the State, under the new registry law, will meet on Monday, April 5th, and hold for three days a board, sitting in the several precincts in the county from 9 a. m. till 5 p. m. Registrations have to be made personally. In case of sickness or absence, the time so register is extended three or four weeks. Below we give the principal features of the law as classified by an exchange:

To be a legal voter a person must be a male over 21 years of age, either native born or have declared his intention of becoming a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the State for 6 months and of the county ninety days preceding the day of election and of the precinct upon the date of registration. Tickets must all be printed on paper furnished by the Secretary of the State. No distinguishing mark is allowed to be placed on the outside of a ticket, but any design adopted to distinguish regular partisan tickets is allowable on the inside.

The County Judge and Commissioners constitute a board of registration, to which all contested cases must be appealed, and will meet on the first Monday following the close of registration. They must sit three days, but not more than ten days.

In case of special elections registration must be made 30 days before the election. Challenges must be made either against registration or voting for any legal cause, whereupon the person desiring to register or vote may be sworn as touching their competency. Any person registering fraudulently may be fined in any sum not exceeding \$1,000, or imprisoned in the penitentiary one year or both in the discretion of the court. Fraud by a clerk or Judge may be punished by a fine of not less than \$200 or more than \$1,000, or imprisonment one year or both.

Advice Gratis.

As the political pot is commencing to boil freely, we vouchsafe a little advice (no charges) to unfledged candidates who are about to enter the political arena and make an effort to get elected to office. Never approach an editor and ask him for his support unless you are taking his paper, for such an act will convince him at once that you are possessed of more cheek than brains and are not wise in the ways of the world, and therefore are an unfit candidate. Again, it is not a dead thing that he will support you, though you are taking his paper, much depending upon circumstances. But the very fact of your being a patron of the paper, gives you the right to approach and talk confidentially with him. If you want office bad, walk right into a newspaper office, pull out your weasel, and plank down a year's subscription, and then with the mere intimation that you are looking toward the political horizon, hoping for something to turn up, walk right out and leave the editor to draw his own inferences. The chances are he will draw them to your advantage. If he does, you can count on his support, and it will not be a tame one either. This advice is not intended for old political hacks who have wasted the best part of their lives trying to get office, but were never sharp enough to understand that boring newspaper men for support without ever putting a little oil in the hole to lessen the friction of the auger, is what's the matter with them. Editors, generally speaking, care nothing for money, but they do admire men endowed with a little common sense.

The Senate on Friday listened to the first out-and-out anti-Chinese speech ever made in that hall. Other Senators have deplored the fact of Chinese immigration, but Senator Mitchell proposed to stop it. It will probably take him and other men of his views about four years to educate the Senate up to the level of the measures he proposes. We have no hope for the bill this session. We shall have a little well intentioned tinkering of the old law, which will make immigration a little more costly than it now is, but will let in all there is a demand for. Mitchell's bill is direct and to the point. It is the only bill which will force the Chinese to respect our laws. It is admitted now that the last Chinese treaty will have to be abrogated.

We learn that candidates are increasing rapidly and as the offices are inadequate to the wants of the democracy, we would suggest that a Recorders office should be established. We believe there is a law for the creation of this office and its need cannot be questioned. It would furnish another place for the "hungry and thirsty."

The time is near at hand when the people will be called upon again to elect the officers who are to administer the affairs of the county for the next two years. In view of the present condition of the county finances, it should be their business to see that none but thoroughly honest, capable and economical men are elected. They should be business men and such as scorn to wear any man's collar. No man is fit to be a public officer who has not the ability and the independence to conduct the business of his office without fear or favor or dictation from any source. If the SENTINEL mistakes not the temper of Jacksonville voters and the interest manifested by the tax payers who must adjust the big debt piled up against them, the democratic party had better look considerably out who it nominates and see that they are good men and pledged more to the public good than to party prejudice. No one man power should be suffered to rule, and especially should no one be elected who has not the courage and dignity to denounce and suppress the spoils hunting system that has grown to such proportions in this county in the past few years. Democrats have shown themselves to be independent in the past and the SENTINEL predicts the same unless a good, sound ticket and freed from the spoils system be nominated, that there will be more independence manifested this year than ever before, and that if it be in any sense fettered with the one man power or controlled by the machine, it will go to the wall.
