SUBSCRIPTIONS DUE.—The quartz mill is now in operation. The mill company have performed their part of the contract and the mill can truthfully say is a nice one and we believe will do all that is claimed for it. It was understood by those who subscribed to the enterprise, that the subscriptions would be due upon the completion of the mill. The subscribers will be waited upon next week when it is hoped all will cheerfully respond as the enterprise cannot fail to be of incalculable benefit to this community.

FRUIT GROWERS.—The annual meeting of this society was held in the City Hall on Saturday last with President B. F. Miller in the chair. By the request of members the constitution and by-laws were read, and the minutes of the last meeting approved. The next in order being the election of officers for the ensuing year; it was decided on motion of C. C. Beckman to suspend the rules and vote by acclamation. The following gentlemen were unanimously elected: B. F. Miller, President; G. F. Pennabaker and H. W. Shipley, Vice-Presidents; Abram Bish, Treasurer, and J. H. Griffin, Secretary. After discussing various subjects connected with fruit culture, a motion was made by Col. R. F. Maury to adjourn, subject to the call of the president. J. H. GRIFFIN, Secretary.

THE EXECUTION.—If nothing unexpected appears O'Neil, the murderer, will have expiated his crime on the gallows before another issue of the SENTINEL appears. The Sisters of Mercy pay him regular visits but all other visitors are excluded. O'Neil will not yet acknowledge his case as hopeless and is said to be as defiant and snub as ever. Mr. Moon, a relation of his from Colusa, Cal., was here this week making a last effort to have the sentence commuted and is now at Salem to get an interview with Governor Moody. Should this fail the condemned man will be executed in the Court House yard at 12:30 p. m., on Friday next. A high board fence will enclose the scaffold and only a few spectators will be allowed inside. The Jacksonville Fire Department will be called out on that day to act as guards and to assist the Sheriff in keeping peace and order.

OUR QUARTZ MINES.—A visit up Jackson creek last Sunday, on horse back, has caused us to give a brief mention of some of our quartz ledges, and the men who work them. The first is a ledge immediately above Judge Day's residence, located by Judge L. R. Webster, Henry Page, Jr. and Wm. Menner, with, at the least calculation, about two hundred tons of ore on their dump, which if thoroughly tested, may prove good. From this ledge, we travel on until the New Elitade mine is reached at the mouth of Armstrong gulch, this being worked by a company composed of Krause, Hoffman, McKenzie, Wintjen and Tom Brown. The company have about ten tons of ore on the dump, about which, much free gold can be seen with the naked eye. A contract has been made with the mill for the crushing of their ore. Going on up the right hand fork of Jackson creek, the next is the Silver ledge, being worked by Brown, Klippel and Moore. A fifteen foot shaft has been sunk and about twenty tons of ore on their dump. Several extensions have been taken up on this ledge by different parties. From this point, we can see several ledges high up on the mountain to the right—so high up that we were unable to visit them—and therefore cannot describe them. In traveling further west we find a location made by Birdsey and Robinson; but no work done as yet. And next we find ourselves at the Timber Gulch Tunnel, where Cassel and Huggins are working, making an average inwardness of two feet per day, the tunnel being now about ninety feet in length. The next ledge, in which we come in contact with, is owned and worked by Geo. Rieves, who has a small amount of ore in sight. From here, we travel on to the Bell and Moody ledge, where we find about ninety tons of ore, which is claimed to assay thirty dollars per ton. Several extensions have also been taken up here. From the above mine we return to the forks of the creek, and go to the Fred Grob mine. This ledge is immensely rich, which has been proven by the boys, who have been picking up gold from the rock which he has at the mill. We also satisfied ourselves of the fact, by seeing plenty of free gold at the ledge. Extensions on this ledge have been taken up by several parties, and in the same district, a well and defined three foot ledge has been discovered by Kearn and Moore. A miner has been put to work on this ledge; but is now engaged in building a cabin, and so far the value of the ledge is unknown. On the mountain to the left from here, we find a tunnel of about seventy feet, now located and being worked by a company composed of Menner, Riley, Miller and Smith. As our readers will see that our fortunes are all at stake on Jackson creek, therefore we have been unable to visit other rich districts; but have heard of several locations made on Rich gulch and in John Orth's pasture, which will probably prove as good as can be expected.

The mail contract on the route between Medford and Big Butte has been awarded to James Herley of this place at \$784 per year.

Last week Judge Deady issued an order authorizing Receiver Koehler, of the O. & C. R. R., to haul 540 carloads of lime rock from Gold Hill, Jackson county, to Portland.

Voters of Central Point school district voted a special school tax of 12 1/2 mills last Monday—10 mills for a school house and 2 1/2 mills for carrying on the school this year.

From San Francisco to New York for \$28.50; from the same point to Kansas City \$15.50 are the lowest rates reported. From Portland slightly higher rates have prevailed.

S. S. Aiken of Florence Rock was here several days this week getting supplies for his saw mill at that place. He also bought several yoke of oxen from Sam Cook while here.

James W. Simpson talks of becoming a resident of Jacksonville and we hear it whispered around that he would not decline a nomination for the Shrieverly if tendered him.

Orlando Rose and wife and Henry D. Kubli of Applegate paid Jacksonville a visit this week. The latter has now turned "backaroo" and has already gathered quite a band of young cattle.

A. H. Maegly and wife have returned from a visit to Portland. While absent Mr. M. ordered a large stock of hardware and farming implements most of which will arrive by next freight.

One of the most curious laws passed by the last Legislature was that requiring all paper for tickets to be bought of the Secretary of State. This goes well with the registry and bicycle laws.

The Democratic State Central committee has been called to meet at Portland, March 20th. It will devote up on the committee to fix the place as well as the time of holding the State Convention.

Not long since, while the stage was running, our young Rev. W. P. Williams attempted to take a seat in the stage, but missing his footing went down beneath the wheel. Fortunately he got brained, only.

Prospecting for quartz goes steadily on and several new discoveries showing good prospects are reported this week. So anxious are some of the locators that the County Clerk has been called out of bed to record claims.

A voting precinct was established in Meadows precinct by the County Court this week and J. B. Welch, John Bailey and Polk Hill were appointed registers with W. G. Mayfield and Scott Morris as clerks.

A new brewer arrived at Veit Schultze's place on the 2d and beer has been flowing free ever since. It will take several years before the boy can take full charge of the establishment but Veit says he will board him free until that time.

The sum of ten thousand dollars appropriated for the bridge across Rogue river at Grant's Pass, has been drawn from the state treasury and deposited in the First National Bank at Portland, subject to the order of the Josephine county court.

L. D. Montgomery and Dan Hunt were here this week. Both went to Roseburg accompanied by Dr. Wing Lee, and a satisfactory arrangement for the transfer of the Grand Apple gate mines to the Chinese company is expected to be made at that place.

The case of the State of Oregon vs. David Whitstone for criminal trespass was tried at Medford this week defendant securing a change of venue by swearing that in his opinion he could not get justice in Jacksonville. Justice Birkdell fined him \$50 and costs.

Willis Hayes this week showed us some rich quartz found in his claim on the north side of Rogue river for which it does not require a magnifying glass to see the gold. Another small piece found there yielded \$8 in fine gold when pounded out in a hand mortar.

Our new quartz mill steamed up this morning to get the machinery adjusted and in working order and the crushing of quartz will be commenced on Monday next. Fred Grob & Co. have something like 20 tons of rock on the dump ready for crushing and several other parties will commence hauling at once. For ordinary rock \$5 per ton is charged by the mill for crushing.

The Democrats who are laughing in their sleeves at the third party movement should turn their attention to Jackson county. This stronghold of Democracy comes boldly to the front with the first call for a Prohibition party convention. A thorough prohibition success would go far to wipe out that 100,000 debt that is so burdensome to our southern Oregon friends.—"Prohibition Star."

The third and fourth class postmasters of this country have struck for higher wages. They held a National Convention at Chicago and organized. Very appropriately, Mr. Grubb, of Alabama, was elected President, Mr. Pickett, of Nebraska, Vice President of the nation.

It was the anniversary of our birthday and our marriage and it was also the second anniversary of the Band playing out of the practice room. To say that the boys have improved wonderfully under the leadership of Prof. Schmidt during that time is not required as they are now willing to compete with any amateur band in the State for the championship.

A quarrel between Webb Parker and Law Ross at Lakeview, which had been brewing for some time, culminated in an "appeal to arms" last Tuesday morning. The shooting occurred in the hotel in Lakeview. Parker fired three shots, but Ross for some reason, could not get his pistol to go off. Nobody was hurt, fortunately—a kind of a French duel. Parker has been held in \$500 bonds to keep the peace and answer before the next grand jury.—"Tidings."

Back in a Chinese cook who has been in the employ of Mr. George Smith, of Scott valley, for a number of years, out of his quins one day last week, changed his name to Tommy McFadden and will at once make application to become a citizen of the United States. Mr. McFadden speaks good English and delights in fine clothes, which are made to order after the very latest styles. He is a good judge of cigars, sweats beautifully and by acquiring the liquor habit will make a good citizen. His countrymen condemn his rascals but Mc. wote not.—Yreka "Union."

The M. E. Church gave us a pleasant entertainment last Sunday evening. The parts taken were mostly by little children, and they did their parts so happily. The superintendent of the Sunday school, Rev. W. P. Williams, had a part to play too and it was of some very appropriate remarks. The singing of the Choir, judging from overheard remarks, was very much appreciated by the audience. The Choir consisted of Misses Armstrong, Miss Annie E. Johnson, Messrs. Eddy, Flech and Kress. Mrs. Rev. W. P. Williams did her part well at the organ. The entertainment was free, but a goodly collection was taken up at the close. There never was such a house of people in that church before, so many that every inch of standing room was taken and some had to turn away.

Every reader of the "Oregonian" has heard of the celebrated Griswold case which has been in the United States courts for more years than many can remember. The suit was brought by the government to recover a large amount paid to Griswold on fraudulent war claims. Judgment was obtained against him and he was stripped of all his visible possessions. He sometimes since asked the government to compromise, and accept \$100 as payment in full of the balance due. The secretary of the treasury has agreed to this compromise. R. F. Dowell, the informer in the case, who received half the money collected from Griswold, claims that this action on the part of the secretary of the treasury will be beneficial to him, as his half of the judgment will remain in full force, and he will be enabled to get the whole of the remainder of Griswold's property, including the amount due Griswold on the Oregon Indian war claims.—"Oregonian."

We learn from trustworthy sources that there are at least 2,000 men at work on the railroad above Dalia, crowding the work along, to reach Bailey's as soon as possible, the railroad company owning that ranch, and the noted springs thereon. The railroad forces comprise mostly Chinamen, only 250 white men being employed. Work, however, is given to all white men desirous of working for a dollar a day and board. The driving away of Chinamen from various sections, besides the railroad company to secure plenty of Chinese laborers at cheapest rates.

It is reported that Scobie has received orders to crowd the masonry work as fast as possible, as his work must be completed first, in order to allow speedy progress with the cast-iron men engaged in grading and filling the tunnel work is also being pushed forward as fast as possible, from both ends of each tunnel, with day and night shifts, as only a certain number of men can work in the tunnel at a time.—"Journal."

WASHINGTON, March 4.—After three hours debate the house committee on rivers and harbors decided upon the following amounts: For improvement of the mouth of the Columbia river, \$209,000; for the Cascade, \$230,000; for the Columbia and Willamette, from the sea to Portland, \$100,000; for the upper Willamette, \$30,000; for Yaquina bay, \$60,000. The amounts appropriated for Oregon waterways are all above the average of appropriations for rivers in the East.

ESCAPED FROM JAIL.—The young half-breed, Tommy Moore, who has been confined in the jail at Linkville since his bold attempt last January to steal several barrels of barbed wire and provisions from the warehouse of Reams, Martin & Co., made his escape last Tuesday night, by burning a hole through the wooden floor of the jail and digging out through the foundation. His plan, says the "Tidings," displayed much ingenuity and shrewdness. After building a fire on the floor he placed over it a large oil can with open bottom and a hole at the top, and on top of the can a joint of stove pipe, to create a draft. It is not known what time he succeeded in getting out, and no trace of his whereabouts has yet been discovered. Some time ago he had burned the lock out of his door and was just about ready to go when discovered. Since then he has caused considerable trouble by breaking shackles and trying to give the sheriff the slip on several occasions.
