Democratic Convention.

The Democratic convention was held in this place last Saturday. There was a free attendance of the delegates excepting three. A majority came here the day before the convention in order to make such combinations as would suit the various rings. They met at the United States Hotel Hall. Mr. Ben Haymond was chosen chairman and R. A. Miller secretary. Much work had been done the night before in trying to harmonize the various factions that were threatening the peace and harmony of the party, but without success. Early in the morning it became evident that it would not be safe to give the nomination for Sheriff to W. J. Plymale, of this place, as it might create too much discord in the ranks, therefore a combination was made which transferred the whole Plymale force to Mr. Brad Dean, which gave him the nomination. The names of W. J. Plymale and N. Jacobs were placed in nomination, the former for Sheriff and the latter for Clerk, both withdrew, each making a speech giving as a reason for their withdrawal, that they desired harmony in the Democratic ranks and were willing sacrifice to rights that were due them rather than jeopardize the grand old party. Those speeches may have their effect after the election, that is, if anything is lying around loose, they may come in for the last piece of the pie. Some of the delegates expressed themselves, satisfied while others left with evident dissatisfaction and threats. Butte creek was left out in the cold, with the cold assurance that two years from this convention they may be recognized. They were admonished to wait patiently for their turn at the spoils. In their selection for the offices of commissioners, we can only say that they are both good men and capable, yet the voters in the county may see a bridge or two ahead of them as well as a road or two that should be taken into consideration.

Re-elect Him.

Judge L. R. Webster is the Republican nominee for Judge of the First Judicial district and J. R. Neil is the Democratic nominee for the same office. There is no politics in the Judiciary; neither should there be. Judge Webster has been tried and has proved himself to be an efficient, obliging and honorable Judge. He has administered the law faithfully, honestly and to the satisfaction of the people regardless of politics. Within the time he has worn the Judicial ermine in this District, many important questions have arisen and he has acquitted himself nobly. President Lincoln remarked that "It was no time to trade horses while crossing the stream," and so say we. Therefore we heartily endorse him, and trust that the voters of the District will re-elect him with an increased majority.

Petition for Pardon.

A petition for the commutation of the sentence of William Briscoe will be presented to the Governor and Board of pardons about the first of June making his term of service end in three years from time of sentence.

Our Representatives.

The following will show that we have active representatives at the National Capital and that they are doing some successful work: WASHINGTON, May 11.—As it passed the house the river and harbor appropriation bill makes the following appropriations for the Pacific coast: Montana \$25,000, California \$322,500, Oregon \$605,000, Washington territory, 14,500.
WASHINGTON, May 11.—Mitchell of Oregon to-day gave notice to the Senate that at the proper time he would offer the following amendments to the river and harbor bill: First, increasing the appropriation for Yaquina bay, Oregon, from \$80,000 to \$160,000; for Coos bay, from \$85,000 to \$50,000; for canal and locks at the cascades of the Columbia, from \$250,000 to \$350,000; for the mouth of the Columbia, from \$150,000 to 400,000; for upper Willamette, above Portland, from \$10,000 to \$15,000 with a proviso that \$4,500 of this amount be expended in improving a ship canal between Portland and Oswego, and the portion between Portland and Elk Rock be first completed; and for an appropriation of \$5,000 for improvement of the Umpqua river, Oregon.

Mr. Jefferson Davis is unquestionably honest in what he says. To his mind the right and justice of the confederate cause are no less to-day than they were a quarter of a century ago. The Southern armies were defeated but the cause is still left, and just such speeches as Mr. Davis is making at Montgomery are calculated more than anything else to bring about precisely the same sectional conditions in which that cause found its original excuse. He may not so intend it, but such will be the effect, and the Republicans of the Northern States will not be slow to profit by it.

For the office of District Attorney the Republicans have put in nomination Capt. Kelley of this place. Capt. Kelley is well known to nearly all of our citizens and even those opposed to him in politics cannot and will not say anything against him as a man nor his fitness for the place. Mr. Kelley has all the qualifications for the office, being a practicing attorney for a long number of years, and we expect to see him voted for by men of all political complexion on account of his fitness for the office.

Which horn of the dilemma will the "Oregonian" grasp? If it supports Penneyer, it stultifies itself in everything it has said against the anti-coolie agitators; and if it wheels into line in favor of Cornelius it shakes hands with Mitchell and his Oregon political machine. It places Mr. Scott in the same predicament that Tad Lincoln was when he fell on the ice—he is too big to cry and it hurts too much to laugh.—Times-Mountaineer.

Mr. Flood we learn made red hot Democratic speeches in Douglas county during the Presidential campaign. The question now is when did the editor of the "Star" experience the change? WASHINGTON, May 12.—The President sent the following nominations to the Senate to-day: John Priest, to be collector of customs at Yaquina, Oregon. Postmasters: Frank W. Osburn, at Eugene City, Ogn.; James B. Crossen, at The Dalles, Ogn.; John B. Frasher, at Tillamook, Cal.

"What more pitiable sight than the hide-bound partisan who feels in prejudice bound to vote for a man that he knows is unfit for the position?" It is already widely quoted by the press throughout the State, and will be a favorite text for the political preachers in the present campaign.
