It is the safest policy to look with distrust upon any damaging stories in reference to candidates which have never been heard of before their nomination. Most of the gentleman on the Republican ticket, State and county, are well known throughout this county, and any discreditable story in reference to them which was never known until since their nomination may safely be set down as a campaign lie.

A Query.

We arise in our seat to ask the Democracy of the First Judicial District of Oregon the following conundrum: Would you vote for a man, a practicing attorney before the bar, who would stoop so low as to approach a grand jury to influence their verdict, would you vote for that kind of a man for Circuit Judge? Our Ticket.

Republican County Convention.

Pursuant to the call of the Republican Central Committee, the delegates elected at the Republican primaries on May 8th, in convention assembled, met in Jacksonville on the 15th inst., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the county offices and nominated the following ticket:

State Senator, Dr. E. P. Geary; Representatives, W. C. Myer and J. H. Griffis; Commissioners, Dolph Carlton and H. Ammerman; County Clerk, M. L. Alford; Sheriff, James Birdsey; Treasurer, A. H. Mægly; Assessor, Geo. M. Love; Surveyor, M. L. McCall.

No nominations were made for Sept. of Public Instruction or Coroner. The committees resolutions reported the following:

Be it resolved by the Republicans of Jackson county assembled.

First—We endorse the platform of principles promulgated; and most heartily ratify the nominations made for State officers by the recent Republican State Convention held at Portland.

Second—We cheerfully approve and ratify the nominations made by the Republican Judicial Convention of this Judicial District for the offices of Circuit Judge and District Attorney. And the Republicans of Jackson county take this opportunity of expressing their gratitude for the non-partisan and independent action of such Democrats who two years ago gave their vote in favor of our present candidate for the office of Circuit Judge. Two years additional trial of his ability upon the bench and of his conduct in social life has more than justified the hopes and greatly increased the confidence of Judge Webster's constituency. We, therefore, confidently believe that the electors of this Judicial District, regardless of party affiliations, who desire to see the law and the principles of equity and jurisprudence ably and honestly administered, will use their best endeavors and vote for the triumphant re-election of Judge Webster.

Third—We believe that the office of District Attorney should be occupied by a lawyer of recognized ability and experience, and that the administration of justice should be honest and economical. Fully confident that Harrison Kelley, the Republican candidate, possesses the requisite qualifications in a greater degree than his Democratic opponent, we urge upon the electors of this Judicial District, who favor the prosecution of criminals and the economical administration of justice to vote for and labor to secure his election.

Fourth—We recognize and declare it to be the sentiment of the Republicans of Jackson county that the office of County Superintendent of our common schools is, and should be, non-partisan and independent of political nominations; we therefore decline at this time to place in nomination any candidate for that office.

Fifth—We deplore the continued increase of the county debt and condemn the unbusiness-like and extravagant administration of county affairs which has caused it. And in the name of the tax-ridden people of the county, we demand that greater care and economy be observed in the transaction of the county business. Our county is now deeply in debt and the same economy should be observed in the administration of her affairs as would be adopted by an individual under the same circumstances.
