SURVIVORS CALLED IN.—The O. P. engineer party under management of M. C. Shaw has been called in, and Sunday it passed through Albany, says the "Bulletin," on the way to Corvallis. The party made preliminary surveys thirty miles east of Albany, reaching Fox valley, and made preliminary location of some ten miles of the road along the North Santiam. It is not yet learned what the company proposes to do.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Martin Heckathorn of Chimney Rock precinct met with an accident on Friday last which proved fatal. He was riding a fractious horse which had thrown him, and holding to the reins pulled the animal on top of himself, which crushed him most frightfully, the unfortunate young man living but a few hours afterwards. The accident happened about 11 o'clock in the forenoon and at 7 o'clock in the evening he died, being unconscious from the time of the accident until death. Mr. Heckathorn was about 22 years of age and leaves a large circle of relatives and friends to mourn his sudden demise. He was buried at Brownboro last Sunday, Rev. A. H. Sundermann conducting the funeral services.

WILLOW SPRINGS OFFICE.—We learn from a letter received from the Hon. Binger Hermann that the Department had promised to re-establish the postoffice at Willow Springs, upon the petition of our Representatives at Washington. The petition was drawn up by Hon. Binger Hermann, and in all probability the service will be restored. It keeps our Representatives very busy undoing the injurious work to Southern Oregon, that has been going on since the present administration came in. They are not contented with reducing our mail service but have ordered the only fort in Oregon to be removed, thereby leaving a large settlement exposed to two tribes of Indians who have been recognized as the most dangerous and treacherous of all the tribes in Southern Oregon. This order will, if carried out, be a great draw back to that section of country, which has been so rapidly settling up in the last few years. We sincerely hope that the order will be revoked.

RELIGIOUS ITEMS.—Rev. F. N. Blanchet will hold services at the Catholic church in this place at the usual time. Rev. F. N. Blanchet will go to Eagle Point the first Sunday in June. Elder M. Peterson will preach at the Missouri flat school house on Sunday at the usual hour. Liberal Sunday-school and Bible class meets every Sunday at 11 o'clock A. M. at the U. M. L. Hall, Talent. Rev. A. R. Bickenbach will hold services at Phoenix in the morning and in the Presbyterian church in this place in the evening. Rev. A. H. Sundermann will hold services at the M. E. church in this place on Sunday morning and at Medford in the evening. The basket meeting announced to take place at the Antelope school house will commence on Saturday before the second Sunday in June, Rev. Jas. Hammer officiating. The rites of baptism will be administered after the morning service on the Sunday following with communion after the afternoon service. All are invited.

TO SURVEY CRATER LAKE.—Capt. C. E. Dutton of the U. S. geological survey will send a party to Crater lake this summer to explore the mysteries of that region. He expects to have all his arrangements completed during the coming month, and to begin actual work about July 1st. Owing to the altitude of the lake it will not be practicable to begin sooner, on account of snows and scarcity of grass for the animals used for transportation. Capt. Dutton will have a large boat and some skiffs built and transported to the lake, and lumber will be taken there to build pontoons or rafts for platforms from which to take soundings. Stations will be fixed around the lake, by means of which soundings can be taken on a network of lines so as to ascertain the general configuration of the bottom of the lake. Professor Condon of Eugene will be conferred with in regard to the scientific work of the survey. Wm. G. Steel of this city, who has been so prominently connected with the effort to have the lake and surrounding country set aside as a national park, will be connected with the party. He is now in correspondence with the railroad and stage companies, endeavoring to secure special rates for parties wishing to visit the lake. It is expected that quite a number of people will make a trip to that section this season.

Judge Townsend received a telegram from Washington Monday, to the effect that A. F. Snelling had been appointed register of the land office at this place, vice Judge Trautman. This is a good appointment, and will be very satisfactory to both political parties of this section.—Lakeview "Examiner."

Orders for the abandonment of Fort Klamath have been received at that post and the troops will be moved on the first of July. This is probably another movement towards retrenchment and reform by the new administration but does not sit well on the stomach of the average Democratic voter in this section. A petition asking that the change be not made is in circulation and receiving the signatures of all our citizens but whether that will do any good remains to be seen.

The "Times" makes a big bugaboo over the fact that J. G. Birdsey appeared before the grand jury not long since as a witness in a case where several parties were indicted for gambling at Sport's Point. Is it not a fact Mr. "Times" that Dear Dear Birdsey's opponent for Sheriff, was also a witness before that same grand jury and gave testimony on that same identical case? The prohibition candidate seems to be the only one not implicated in this case and taken as a whole it is a clear case of the kettle calling the pot black.

About next Monday or Tuesday the trains on railroad will run up to Gibson's, 10 miles north of Delta, where a platform and warehouse will be built, as a temporary station for delivery of passengers and freight. This will save about 10 miles of staging and hauling over the worst portion of the road above Delta, as crossing of State Creek hill is a tedious, difficult and laborious undertaking. It is now positively stated that the road will be up to Bailey's by September, and that the railroad work will be crowded along with the greatest energy to reach the Oregon boundary as speedily as possible.—Yreka "Union."

When the news reached here from Fort Klamath that the post had been ordered abandoned a meeting of citizens was hastily called and a resolution passed protesting against the removal of the garrison. A telegram to that effect was sent to Senators Dolph and Mitchell and Representative Hermann and they were requested to use their best endeavors to secure a revocation of the unjust and unwise order. A remonstrance was at once placed in circulation in the valley, and was gladly signed by every one to whom it was presented, and last evening was mailed to Washington, bearing the signatures of a large number of the leading citizens of Jackson county. Telegrams of remonstrance were sent from Linkville, Lakeview, and memorials of remonstrance with numerous signatures have been or will be forwarded from those places. A special meeting of the Portland Board of Trade was called to consider the matter, and strong resolutions of remonstrance were adopted and forwarded by telegraph to Washington.—"Tidings."

FIRE AT PHOENIX.—On Monday afternoon last, the substantial dwelling house of Mr. L. A. Rose, on the county road just north of Phoenix was entirely destroyed by fire, together with nearly all its contents. At the time the fire was discovered no one was in the house except the children. Mr. Rose was not far distant, however, and, together with others who heard the alarm, hastened to the house, but the fire spread so rapidly that nothing was saved but an organ and a trunkful of clothing. The origin of the fire is unknown, and as the flames were first seen in a room some distance from that in which fire had been kept, it is a mystery. The house and contents were insured for \$1000 in the State Insurance Co., but this will probably not cover more than half the actual loss. Mr. Rose has suffered unusual misfortune of late, and has the genuine sympathy of the whole community in his troubles.—"Tidings."

KILLING AT CANYONVILLE.—Last week, W. J. Sullivan, a quack doctor of Canyonville, gave a woman, whose name was not learned, a dose of medicine. A short time afterward she began growing worse, and to quiet her fears and to show her that it was all right, he took a large dose of the medicine himself. Soon afterward he went into convulsions and lived but a short time, and she lasted but a little while longer. Reports are meagre about the case, as yet. Sullivan was toll collector for the old Canyon Road company, at Canyonville, and for a long time practiced horse-doctoring. He next imagined himself a full fledged physician, and several people were foolish enough to be duped by him and allow him to practice his "profession" on them.

The Fish Commissioners arrived at Portland, Oregon, Saturday. They started on the 8th inst. with 1,000,000 shad. Three hundred thousand died en route; half a million were planted in the Columbia at Wallula, and 200,000 started for Albany, to be placed in the Willamette, together with 500,000 which were hatched en route.

Railroad to Medford.

EDITOR SENTINEL.—Having been requested to give some figures in regard to a branch R. R. from this place to some station on the O. & C. R. R., will submit the following: The first question naturally asked is will it pay, and then how much will it cost, and how should it be operated, by steam, or horse power, what gauge it will be, etc. etc. To the first question will it pay? We say yes, from the first car that runs over the line. Well, why will it pay? Because the traffic now being carried on between Jacksonville and Medford, will more than pay operating expenses, approximating the expense of a road known to the writer, of the same distance, not taking the completion of the O. & C. R. R. into account, as the fast development of the surrounding country, as to the entire cost of building and equipping ready to run, less than \$18,000, be raised. Easy enough, railroads are not paid for when built. Only about one third of the amount will be necessary the first year, long time can be had on the balance. Well, is not \$6,000 a large amount of money to put into an enterprise that will not pay much more than running expenses the first year? No, we think not. When we take into account the fact that there is more than \$500,000 worth of property in Jacksonville, alone, that will be directly benefited, taking all other known roads of a similar character as a criterion to go by. The difference of operating is in favor of steam from the start. Can the County Commissioners grant the right of way along the county road, yes. Would a county fair be a success by having the grounds located midway between the two towns? We think it would. Should a company be organized to build such a line, if not, why not. D.
