TEACHERS' INSTITUTE—The teachers' institute for the first judicial district and Jackson county, will be held at Ashland, beginning August 24th and continuing in session August 25th, 26th and 27th. The State Superintendent and several of the best school workers in the State will be present and assist in the work of the institute. Karewski's flouring mill has undergone a complete overhauling and will start up again on Monday next. Some new and improved machinery has also been added.

Rial Benedict reports good crops on Applegate near his place. L. Chappell is now on the Rikrophi place near by and will raise a large crop of vegetables this year.

We understand that Mr. E. G. Hurl intends starting a newspaper and job office connected, at Roseburg in the near future. Mr. Hurl will make a lively paper.

The Silverton Appeal comes out boldly in the advocacy of abolishing the Immigration board. It asserts that a certain few have used it for their own personal ends, and that it is a colossal humbug.

Mr. Geo. A. Jackson of San's valley brought a load of watermelons to town last Tuesday. As these were the first of the season they were disposed of very rapidly.

James E. Hott returned from Cinnabar last Saturday and is now in charge of T. J. Kenney's saddle shop while the latter is out on a rusticiating trip to the same place.

The mother of Henry and Willis York died at the home place on Applegate Friday night aged about 86 years. The old lady was highly respected by all who knew her.

Sam DeReboam has made an assignment to his father Juan DeReboam. His assets amount to \$400 and his liabilities are only \$650. Rather a small failure.

Jack Dempsey, the pugilist, who was married at East Portland this week passed through the valley Thursday morning accompanied by his bride en route for San Francisco.

The saloon keepers of North Yaquina are quietly folding their tents and stealing away. They do not propose going into the drug business. They prefer to immigrate.

J. H. Stine, formerly editor of the Rogue River "Courier," was in town Tuesday on his return from Klamath county where he has an idea of re-entering the newspaperial field.

The Portland Line and Cement Co., which ships its stone from the time quarry on Rogue river has provided so much of a business success that the capacity of its kilns is to be doubled.

Treasurer Howard of Josephine county has received \$584.60 from the board of school land commissioners at Salem, and Superintendent Hathaway will soon appropriate it among the different districts.

J. N. Castled is now superintending both of the tunnels in the Bowden ledge and the Johnson ledge owned by C. C. Beckman. He is rushing the last mentioned making from 15 to 20 feet per week.

The New Eldorado Mining Co. this week entered into a contract with Henry Kippel whereby the latter agrees to take out and deliver at the mill 100 tons of quartz from said mine for \$1.70 per ton.

Rev. A. R. Beckenbach and Prof. Watt have been speaking their vacation in Eugene Rock precinct held up at their time mostly in building roads. They returned this week with bistered hands.

Rev. W. P. Williams will attend the Methodist conference to be held at Forest Grove next month and does not know where he will be situated next. He has made many friends while a resident of Jacksonville.

Several car loads of nails were received by our local merchants by last freight. Among those who received them are A. H. Margy & Co., K. Kuhl, John Miller and N. Fisher. Mr. Kuhl has reduced the price to \$4 per keg.

The contest between the District Attorneys and the Justices of the Peace is still going on each party watching the other one as to what is going on. No case has yet come up to give the matter a test.

A cloud burst at the head of Little Applegate this week did considerable damage filling up the Sterling C. Co. ditch and overflowing some of the garden spots on Phil Gleaves' place. No other damage resulted that we have heard of.

C. H. Pickens of San's Valley, late County Commissioner of Jackson county, is an applicant for the position of Indian agent at the Siletz reservation. As we R-publicans have no show for the office we don't care if he is successful in getting the place.

A Gold Hill correspondent of the "Oregonian" says: F. M. Johnson of San Francisco, agent for the Wiswell quartz mill, has purchased D. F. Fisher's ditch around Gold Hill. He contemplates putting up one of the mills, with a view of working Gov. Chadwick's mine.

Joseph Schmitt this week tried the theory of one of those patent gates, where you don't have to get out of a buggy to open it, and in consequence he now wears his arm in a sling, nearly the whole structure having fallen upon him when trying to open it according to directions.

Tan W. H. Bear, a sailing vessel, was wrecked Friday night the 23d at the entrance to the Columbia river. Her cargo consisted of \$70,000 worth of iron for the O. R. & N. Co. The captain and crew were saved but the vessel, valued at \$40,000 and cargo will prove a total loss.

The fish dealer at Oregon City is reported "a thing of the past," having gone to the Oregon City Enterprise asking: "Where is the solid masonry called for in the specifications of the fish land?" And where is the \$10,000 worth that the State paid its gold coin for? "Abolitionists" asks the "Astorian."

RAILROAD ITEMS—We learn that the track is laid this side of Bailey's, with expectation of reaching Uncle Dick's Soda Springs within three weeks. Nearly all the railroad workers are now in the country, and most of them will soon be at work on the Sacramento river crossing and in the canyon further north. It is reported that an immense blast of some 14 tons of powder was to be set off near Upper Soda Springs House, at a point on the river. Uncle Dick was offered \$10,000 for damages to his property, on day before his death, which was refused. It was expected the blast would be set off last Saturday, but a postponement has been made on account of the full amount of powder not yet hauled to the place designated. The "Astorian" learns from W. A. Pryor, who returned from upper Sacramento this week, that work on the railroad is being pushed vigorously northward. Between four and five thousand men are employed, being scattered along from Castle Creek to Strawberry valley in Shikyou county. The track is laid to within a couple of miles of Lower Soda Springs, to which point construction trains now run. Here Scobie has a large force of men at work on the majority of two large bridges, and expects to be ready for the iron work in a week or ten days, when it is expected to arrive from the East. The road is graded to the county line, and a large force of graders crossed the line this week and began grading in the vicinity of Upper Soda Springs. Regular freight and passenger trains run to Hazel Creek, but as soon as bridges below Bailey's are completed, it is expected trains will run to that point or to Castle Creek between the two springs. Considerable blasting is being done between Soda Springs and Strawberry Valley, where the road runs through rocks and long tunnels. [Journal.]

SUDEN DEATH—Martin Hoover, well known in this county, having been a resident for over 30 years, died at the county hospital last Tuesday night aged nearly 80 years. On Tuesday afternoon he was in town dressed up in his best clothes and informed us that he came in to get his hair cut, but he failed in this. Mr. Hoover, who was a heavy smoker and then went to bed, and next morning was found dead, apparently having died of heart disease. Illness and old age forced him to the hospital but he continued work until the day of his death and was respected and mourned by many friends here.

A son-in-law of twenty-nine pack ages, contents unknown, arrived in San Francisco on the 21st inst. from Liverpool by the bark Kylemore, marked to O. H. S. Portland, in care of the Pacific Coast Steamship company. Name of the company officers either in San Francisco or Portland are able to discover for whom this mark is intended. Any party expecting such consignment should report it at the traffic department, corner of Front and D streets, at once, so that the goods can be ordered forward. [Oregonian.]

The following shows the number of school children in each of this district's counties, and the amount due each on account of the distribution of the common school fund interest, ordered by the State board of school land commissioners on July 20th: Jackson, 3,893 children, \$3,422.70; Josephine, 1,694 children, \$1,884.00; Klamath, 582 children, \$3,238.80; Lake, 576 children, \$518.40. The rate is 90 cents per child.

Hon. Theo. Cameron has received the endorsement of a Democratic nomination and been reappointed Postmaster at Uniontown. The appointing power must have thought he was a Democrat after getting elected to the Legislature in a county where the majority is about 400 that way but Ted will give satisfaction to all causes nevertheless, regardless of politics.

A superstitious subscriber who found a spider in a copy of his paper, wants to know if it is considered a bad omen. Nothing of the kind. The spider was merely looking over the columns of his paper to see what merchant was not advertising, so that it could spin its web across the store door, and be free from disturbance.

Justice Hurl this week had notice served on Justice Foundry asking for the dockets and other documents connected with the cases of Justice of the Peace, of his precinct, now in possession of the latter, but Foundry has failed to answer so the matter stands the same as it was. The community is hoping to see the matter settled one way or the other.

Who got lost in the Shikyou Evan Reames of Klamath county says it wasn't him but the boys in camp at Cinnabar want to know why he didn't come to supper before the following day. He says the deer was too heavy but it is our belief that Evan forgot to take his compass along.

The mail bags carried into Maine, Kansas and Iowa are used to be getting very heavy since the department promulgated its new regulation allowing "well packed liquids" to be mailed.
