How to cool a Cellar.

A great mistake is sometimes made night air is unbealthy -it is as nore as the air of midday, and is really drier. The cool air enters the apartment during the night, and circulates through it. The window should be closed by sunrise in the morning and kept closed and shaded through the day. If the air, of the cellar is damp, it may be thorough ly dried by placing in it a peck of fresh lime will in an open box. A peck of lime will absorb about seven pounds or more three quarts of water, and this way a cellar or milk room may soon be dried, even in the hotteste weather.
