Maine Election.

The election in Maine is over and has resulted in a decided victory for the Republicans notwithstanding the united efforts of the Prohibitionists and Democratic parties to crush out the Republicans and make Maine a Democratic state. St. John and Neal Dow followed Blaine through the state speaking not against the Democratic party, for their indifference to the temperance question but censured all the efforts against the Republicans, pursuing the same course that was done by St. John in the state of New York, and which doubtless resulted in the defeat of Blaine. It seems very surprising indeed that the Maine Prohibitionists should persist in establishing a third party after having Prohibition laws on her statute books for the last thirty years; yet it is well known that plenty of grog-shops can be found there for the simple reason that a law of that character can never be enforced in a country like ours. All parties in that state acquiesce in this question—it has no political from the two old parties, yet the Prohibitionists seem determined to make Maine a Democratic state in order, as their leaders say, to drive the Republicans to them. They may do so, but they will only place the Democratic party in power and keep that party there for many years to come, and as that party is outspoken against Prohibition they can rest assured that their object will never be accomplished. A careful view of this temperance question will convince any reasonable man that to force the issue of Prohibition upon the Republican party would re-enforce the Democracy so much as to make an effort to defeat them almost hopeless, as it would drive at least one-third of the Republican party to the Democracy. This increase with the solid south would make an easy walk over for the Democracy and Prohibition set back for at least twenty years.

"Josephine county and southern Oregon will never make further progress." "No machinery will ever come here." "Our Land is account." "We have got no mines worth developing." "The railroad will not bring capital nor strangers into the country." "We have got no timber fit for lumber or furniture." "Our Lime stone is not good for anything nor does it go on the cars to Portland;" they just take it down and dump it into a canyon to make believe. "We have have got no machinery nor have we got any water power that would propel machinery nor will we ever have any." "We have got no good churches or schools, and never will have." "So far as health is concerned people die here the same as they do elsewhere, and with regard to fruit there never was any good fruit raised here." "Peach trees don't bear in two years from the seed." "We don't want people to come here and if they do come, we want them to leave."

Whenever a man becomes fossilized and moss grown this is the way he talks. Once upon a time a resident and chronic croaker of southern Oregon gave the late Jacob Ish of Jacksonville a lecture something like the above, whereupon the old man dryly remarked "Well, you can't be doing well." If a man had a fine horse for sale would he deem it good policy to depreciate his good points to a probable purchaser. Go to work and you will feel better and if you do not then move.—[Grants' ass Courier.

Amelia Jackson, daughter of Jackson who shot and killed Col. Elmer Ellsworth for pulling down the confederate flag at Alexandria, Va., in 1861, has been appointed to a position in the patent office at Washington. It is not probable that any member of Ellsworth's family has the favor of the Government.

As the United States Senate now stand, with Mr. Williams as the successor of Mr. Hearst, there are forty-two Republicans to thirty-two Democrats. This is its political complexion till the expiration of the present Congress next spring. As summed up by the New York "Tribune," there thirty-four Republican and thirty-three Democratic Senators holding over, from States in which the result is measurably certain. Mahone's term expires on the 4th of March, and of course will be succeeded by a Democrat, and the next Legislature in California will elect Williams' successor. California, New Jersey, New York, Indiana, Connecticut, Michigan and Pennsylvania are to elect Senators to succeed Republicans. Nevada and West Virginia are to elect successors to Democratic Senators. Delaware, Florida, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Tennessee, and Texas are as free from doubt as are Maine, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Nebraska, Ohio, Rhode Island, Vermont and Wisconsin, and no political change may be expected from those States. It will be a close contest and unless the Republicans are duly vigilant in their legislative elections it is within the possibilities that they will lose control of the upper house.

Merritt, ex-Principal Public School, Jacksonville, D. V. S. Reid, County Superintendent Linn County, Albany; J. B. H. rner, A. B. Principal Public School Roseburg.

Maine has gone Republican by a larger majority than at any time within the past fifteen years (not presidential), and the Republicans have carried every congressional district and elected two-thirds to three-fourths of the legislature. The Prohibition vote that was to swallow up the Republican party, has labored as the mountain and brought forth a mouse. The total vote it is thought will exceed 137,000, and the Prohibition vote will not exceed 3500.

General Brady, of star route notoriety, in an interview said in regard to his forthcoming book, that he proposed to place several alleged Statesmen in public pillory, and to give the inside history of the Florida election, the returns of 1876, and the star route investigation and trials. He will embellish his book with facsimile, autograph letters memoranda, which will speak for themselves.

Dispatches from all directions announce that subscriptions for the relief of sufferers at Charleston are pouring in at a rate unexpected. No doubt the amount of funds contributed will be amply sufficient for every want.

Henry George, the famous eastern socialist, has been nominated by a large convention for mayor of New York city. It is estimated that he will receive from 15,000 to 20,000 votes.

Speed Programme of Races

COMMENCING

Wednesday, Sept. 29, 1886,

CONTINUING FOUR DAYS.

For racing purposes this district shall comprise Siskiyou, Trinity, Shasta and Modoc counties, California, and Jackson, Klamath and Lake counties, Oregon.

First Day—Wednesday, Sept. 29th.

Race No. 1.—Running race free for all mile heats, 3 in 3; purse \$200; 1st horse \$50, 2d horse \$30.

Race No. 2.—Trotting race, free for all 4 year old horses owned in the district prior to May 1st, 1886, mile heats, 3 in 3; purse \$200; 1st horse \$50, 2d horse \$30.

Second Day—Thursday, Sept. 30th.

Race No. 3.—Running race, free for all mile heats, 3 in 3; purse \$200; 1st horse \$50, 2d horse \$30.

Race No. 4.—Trotting race for two year old colts stakes of 1886, mile heats, 2 in 3; purse of \$150 added by the association to be divided as follows: 1st colt to receive 70 per cent. of stakes and added money; 2d colt to receive 20 per cent. of same, and 3d colt to receive 10 per cent. of same.

Race No. 5.—Novelty running race, single dash of one mile; purse \$150, to be divided as follows: 1st horse to 1/4 pole, \$30; 1st horse to 1/2 pole, \$20; 1st horse to 3/4 pole, \$10; 1st horse to full mile, \$50.

Third Day—Friday, Oct. 1st.

Grand Parade of Stock.

Race No. 6.—Running race for two year old colts stakes of 1886, single dash of half mile, purse of \$25 added by the association, to be divided as follows: 1st colt to receive 75 per cent. of stakes, and added stakes, and 2d colt 25 per cent.

Race No. 7.—Trotting race, free for all horses owned in this district prior to May 1, 1886, that have never beaten 2:30 mile heats, 3 in 3; purse \$200; 1st horse \$50 dollars; 2d horse 50 dollars.

Fourth Day—Saturday, Oct. 2d.

Race No. 8.—Trotting race, free for all mile heats, 3 in 3; purse \$0 dollars; 1st horse 25 dollars; 2d horse 75 dollars.

Race No. 9.—Running race, free for all 3/4 mile and repeat, purse \$200 dollars; 1st horse 150 dollars; 2d horse 50 dollars.

Rules and Regulations.

1. Ten per cent. of the amount of the purse shall be the entrance fee. In all the above races except race No. 4 and race No. 6.

2. Entries must be made with the Secretary in Yreka on or before 12 o'clock P. M. of Monday, Sept. 20, 1886, except for race No. 4 and race No. 6.

3. Entries must give name, pedigree and description of horse entered, as far as known.

4. In all the above races, three to enter and two to start.

5. All trotting races must be in harness.

6. National Trotting Association rules to govern trotting races.

7. California State Agricultural Society rules to govern running races.

8. Time made during this meeting shall not be a bar to any race during this meeting.

9. All races over this course shall be bona fide.

10. All parties taking racing stalls at the track will be required to make a deposit of \$5 with the track committee for each stall occupied, the \$5 to be refunded if the horse taking the stall is entered for a purse.

11. Betting will be furnished for race horses thirty days prior to the meeting.
