Ashland Water Works.

Six thousand dollars has been borrowed by the City of Ashland to procure protection against fire, but the plans of the city council have been blocked, and it appears that nothing further can be done in the matter at present. When the matter was discussed and the decision arrived at to borrow money and put it pipes and hydraulic pressure for fire protection three members of the council, Messrs. Bish, Hill and Martin, voted together for the project. Mr. Lytleton, the other member of the council, wanted a fire engine, if anything should be done, instead of the hydraulic pipes. Afterwards an agent of some fire engine house spent several days in Ashland, and Martin promptly changed his mind and became a warm advocate of the engine plan. This leaves the council evenly divided on the question, but as the Mayor (who has the casting vote in case of a tie) is known to favor the original plan of laying pipes, the two engine men, Lytleton and Martin have resorted to the novel method of blocking all business in the council by absenting themselves from the meetings and thus leaving the council without the quorum required for the legal transaction of business. Their object is to prevent any action in the matter till after the annual election, which should occur on the first Monday in November, in the expectation of seeing a new council elected favorable to the purchase of a fire engine.

There arises, however an interesting question as to whether or not an election can be legally held until after a quorum of the council shall have met and appointed election judges and clerks and issued the election notices, as provided for in the city charter. If there be no election then the present officers will hold over, and the blockaders will be beaten on their own game, as by operations of a provision of the charter they will expel themselves from the council by refusal to attend six consecutive regular meetings. It would require till the first Monday in March next to reach that point, but then the deadlock would be broken. Meantime, however, there is considerable other business besides water works which needs the attention of the council, and the spectacle of everything being neglected in this way is one calculated to make more than a few people thoroughly disgusted, to say the least.—[Tidings.]

A colony of 200 people secured a town site at Toledo, a station on the Oregon Pacific railroad, 16 miles from Yaguina city and 23 miles from the Pacific ocean. The Oregon Pacific company presented them with 130 acres of their land grant. The colonists bought a newspaper outfit in Portland Friday, says the "News" and will begin publishing a paper as soon as matters are arranged. Another colony of 1,000 people will shortly come from Mississippi and become a part of the colony. Toledo will then have a population of 1240 and will be the twelfth town in size in Oregon. Until the colony came its inhabitants numbered forty. This is the same colony that intended to settle in Lane county on the lower Suislaw river, but was prevented on account of not being able to procure suitable lands.

The friends of Senator Mitchell will be pleased to learn of his arrival in Portland. It is the Senator's intention to visit the different parts of the state, so as to give personal attention to the different sections. He stopped over a day at The Dalles, for the purpose of examining into matters there that demand his attention. Among the last persons met by the Senator in New York was Mr. Mackay, who informed him that he expected to be in Portland between the 5th and 8th of this month on business connected with his new telegraph line at this place.

No Cyclones in Oregon

A Very strong argument in favor of immigration to Oregon from the States of the upper Mississippi valley is the fact cited by a St Paul paper—the "Pioneer Press"—to show that, within the five months ending on the first day of September, nearly 300 people have been killed in Iowa, Dakota and Minnesota, by cyclones or atmospheric electricity. In the forty years ending with this date, but two people have been killed by a tornado in Oregon and none by lightning; and that tornado, which took place on the 9th of January, 1879, extended from the coast to Prineville and from Ashland to Pendleton. Such an admission as that of the "Pioneer Press" is calculated to make a great many families pack their gripsacks and start for Oregon, and the editor of that paper must be a man of no small degree of courage, or he would not give utterance to such a statement. Oregon's weather may not be quite up to the "Glorious climate of California," but it is vastly superior to that of the States lying on the headwaters of the Mississippi, just far ahead of them as daylight is preferable the dark ones.

Reaching for Eastern Oregon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct 6.—The California & Oregon Railroad is being pushed northward quite vigorously, and will cross the Klamath river at Scott's Bar. From that point surveys have been made for a road to be constructed up the valley of Klamath, passing between the upper and lower Klamath lakes, in the vicinity of Linkville, and penetrate Eastern Oregon. It is very probable the road will not soon form a Portland connection, as the company intend to tap the resources of Eastern Oregon at the earliest possible date. The company has decided on this course owing to the high opinion entertained here of that region. The papers here designated the land of Eastern Oregon as ranking among the richest. The California Railroad Company is satisfied the resources are ample to sustain the road, and predict a rapid settling up. The merchants here claim that San Francisco is the commercial basis and outlet of that region and hail the news with joy.

Our cotem is rather severe in his criticism on the appointment of Quincy A. Brooks to be Collector of Customs at Port Townsend, W. T., from which we must conclude that Grover does not fully understand the wants of the hungry and thirsty in this end of the State. The "Times" remark:

He is no doubt well qualified for the position, but we do not consider him the proper person, and expect to see his nomination unfavorably acted upon by the U. S. Senate, which was too nice to confirm Capt. Beecher, who had been previously appointed to the same office by President Cleveland."

The citizens of Klamath county in mass meeting assembled at Linkville, on Tuesday, Sept 28th 1886, tendered the Hon. Binger Hermann a vote of thanks for the exertions made in their behalf, and in appreciation of his recent visit among them for the purpose of ascertaining their further wants. As this is the first instance in which a member of our delegation in congress has deigned to visit this portion of the state, our citizens naturally feel highly honored and duly grateful.
