

Carlisle's Election

It now turns out that strong suspicion exists, based upon good authority, that Thoebe, the labor candidate, against the great free trade champion, Carlisle, was counted out in the good old fashion way so peculiar to the solid south. It is now announced that Mr. Thoebe will contest his election in the next congress. Nevertheless, Mr. Carlisle will hold his seat and will be a formidable candidate for his old position. The new labor party will, before it is many years older, realize what the Republican party had to contend with in the solid South for the last fifteen years. Their protestation will avail them nothing; for no party other than the Democratic will be allowed to govern the South. Mr. Carlisle can easily be voted in his seat by a Democratic majority. But in doing so, it will enable the Knights of Labor throughout the country to understand the methods used in the south to ensure Democratic success. The cheating of the Republican party at the polls has become so old that but little attention is paid to the matter. But when a party like the labor party, which will be organized throughout the South begins to feel the effect of the counting out business, you can then look for a protest that will have effect, or worse will follow. The lost case will not figure with them. Their party is based upon other grounds much nearer to them than a defunct Confederacy.

Last week the people of the whole Pacific coast were shocked at the murder of an innocent school girl on the streets of San Francisco. Public excitement was wrought to its highest pitch and as the angry mob surged through the streets, the wretched culprit in jail slunk back into the farthest corner of his cell, and every shout of the angry populace was like a dagger at his heart. It is no light thing when twenty thousand infuriated men band together to take the law into their own hands. With nine unpunished murderers in the county jail of San Francisco, it seemed as if a premium was being placed on crime. The patience of the people had been exhausted by the dilatory course of justice, and had the mob been sufficiently organized, it is manifest that they would have strung up all the red-handed prisoners without mercy. There is in all American communities an innate love of justice and horror of crime. And when through quibbles and technicalities the administration of justice is thwarted or prevented and criminals turned loose upon society is no wonder that hungry men, with starving families, who are willing and anxious to obtain honest work, should sometimes become desperate and denounce that kind of civilization which permits such things.

The cold-blooded shooting of a little girl in broad daylight, by a cowardly bully, naturally inflamed the passions of men chaffing at the mockery into which San Francisco law and justice have degenerated. As usual, in such cases, the worst elements came to the surface, and the streets of the metropolis of the Pacific coast for a time were in the possession of a mob, and their seemed a possibility that the scenes of Cincinnati a few years ago were to be repeated.

It is monotonous to read the dispatches concerning the strikes in Chicago. Almost every day the difficulties are about to be settled, yet 30,000 or 40,000 men are out of employment and several regiments of Pinkerton's guards and other officers are watching property and doing all they can to prevent violence. Why don't they send for some of the democratic platform writers and have all fixed up and good times inaugurated at once? Good times and general prosperity were promised and it was said elected in with Cleveland, but the amount of riots and strikes of the last two years indicate that the good times have not yet been inaugurated.

Of Interest to Settlers

The General Land Office, Department of the Interior, has sent a circular to the Registers and Receivers of the United States Land offices, in which the following occurs:

The returns from many district land offices show that the regulation of this office, requiring applicants under the homestead, preemption, timber culture and other laws, to state in their application the place of their actual residence and their postoffice addresses, are not being satisfactorily complied with.

Personal service of notice cannot be given, for this reason, in many cases in which it is important that personal service should be had. Necessary investigation are also seriously impeded for want of this essential information.

You will hereafter see, in all cases, that the place of the actual residence and postoffice addresses of applicants are properly stated in their applications. It is not sufficient to state that the place of residence is in another country. If the residence is in a town or city, the same must be stated and if in a city, the street and number must be given. If the residence of the applicant is in the country in any of the public land States or Territories, the section, township and range which the applicant resides, must be given.

You will not hereafter receive applications in which this requirement is not complied with, but all such applications will be returned for correction to the parties presenting or transmitting the same, and will not be placed on record until the omission is supplied.

Applicants will also be advised that changes of residence subsequent to allowance of application must be reported to the local officers, and when so advised of such change of residence, you will make proper note of the same.

In connection with the above, you are directed to hereafter note upon the paper itself, in case of every filing, declaration or application, (where the same is not executed before you and presented by the applicant in person), the name of the party by whom the same was presented or transmitted.
