Six Hundred Democratic Votes, at Least, Counted But Not Cast.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 7.—The following will appear in the "Commercial Gazette" in the morning: EDITOR COMMERCIAL GAZETTE: In your issue of yesterday I find the following under the heading of Cleveland:

"There will be no contest of Mr. Carlisle's election, as announced by the workingmen of this and adjacent cities are satisfied with what they have done. They say that while there were some irregularities in several counties, they see no chance for disturbing and entering to Jerry for Mr. Carlisle. They do not propose to allow themselves to be used in furthering the purposes of any man or clique, and having asserted their rights and shown their strength they are content. Mr. Carlisle's pathway to re-election as Speaker is consequently clear so far as they are concerned." The count on Friday. I intend to contest Mr. Carlisle's right to the seat as representative from the 11th District of Kentucky. But this proposed contest is not to be made to further the purposes of any man or clique, but to prevent Mr. Carlisle being elected as Speaker of the House; but to assert my own rights, as the lawfully and fairly elected member from this district, and the rights and interests of those who elected me. And I believe it is the universal wish of the "workmen's party" of the district that I shall make the contest. We already have evidence sufficient to throw out over 600 votes in two counties only from Mr. Carlisle's vote, and add about fifty votes to my own, and thus reduce his majority to about 100, and do not doubt being enough in other counties to succeed in the contest.

From the "Democrat" published in this city, we learn that a Portland purchasing agent received an order from Josephine county to purchase a keg of salt butter, on going over city found there was no such article in for sale. This shows that not only are the people of the Josephine county, (which is naturally suited to dairying) oblivious of their best interests, but it also shows that the farmers in most other districts of the State are tarried with the same stick, why is it that the Oregon farmers will persist in raising wheat crops mainly, which for years past has not been remunerative, while it is continually depleting their soil, why is it that they do not generally adopt a system of mixed husbandry and supply our markets with first-class butter and cheese?

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
