A RAILROAD RUMOR.—A rumor has gained credence to the effect that work is to be commenced soon by the C. & O. R. R. Co. upon a long tunnel on the located route of that road at Bailey hill on the southern slope of the Siskiyou. The rumor can be traced to no authoritative source, but it is not unlikely that work will begin there if it is the intention of the C. & O. to continue building with the view of connecting with the O. & C. MORE TELEGRAPH TROUBLES.—Sheriff Minto arrested A. A. Jack, foreman of the construction party of the Pacific Postal Telegraph company yesterday, on a complaint sworn out by a French Priest resident for trespass. Mr. Jack set poles in the man's yard, and hence the complaint. The matter was settled by the defendant paying the costs and promising to set them in a less objectionable place. This is the second time Mr. Jack has been arrested on a charge of trespassing on the property of the worthy French Priests. [Statesman.]

FORT KLAMATH.—A Washington dispatch of 22d says: "The probable disposition of the military reservation at Fort Klamath is still unknown. The sale of the lands involved has been suspended by the interior department until all who desire to argue the matter shall have been heard by the secretary of war. In the meantime the garrison, which the secretary of war repeatedly ordered to the post, will be maintained there as before. Unless good and sufficient reasons be offered for the continuance of military rule, the lands to be in the interior department will be entered into sale."

Portland News says: A young man about twenty-eight or thirty years of age, black eyes, dark hair and a tongue as glib as any one ever possessed has been passing counterfeit dollars on the streets of interior towns. He is a sociable fellow and when he reaches a town he becomes instantly acquainted with all the "boys." His stay is generally limited to one day, and when he goes the "boys" generally find themselves in possession of spurious coins received in change for genuine. The fellow was in Portland about ten days ago and gave the name of Harrison. He passed a counterfeit dollar on a young man and left town to avoid arrest. He hails from San Francisco.

SISKIYOU.—The Shasta "Courier" says the railroad company has selected the very chosen spot of Northern California upon which to build a town, and from present appearance it will be a thriving little place noted for its surroundings and its enterprising people, and the institutions they propose to establish. The new place is called Siskiyau, after one of the earliest pioneers of Siskiyou county. Work will be commenced at once to erect the buildings necessary for the town, which is to spring up in a short time. Already a turntable has been constructed, a huge water tank is built, and in a few months the freight house and depot, and a large two-story hotel will be put up by the company. Grounds have also been reserved for a public park. Next Spring a large round house and much a shop will be erected. It will be necessary to have establishments of this kind, in order that engines and cars may be repaired, if they are damaged while going over the numerous heavy grades between Redding and the Oregon line. Siskiyau is a central point.
