The citizens of Yreka are discussing the importance of building a railroad from that place to connect with the main line. The Yreka people have the capital, energy and pluck to build the road. A connection of that kind will enable Yreka to hold her position as the main business place of Shasta valley.

We hope that the committee authorized to amend our city charter, so as to enable the people of this place to raise funds for the purpose of building a railroad from this place to the main line, will proceed at an early date in preparing the bill, so it may be ready for our members to introduce early in the sessions of the legislature.

The Portland "News" reached us on the morning of the 22nd containing twenty pages, descriptive of the recent progress and mining interests of the Northwest. The information given will be of great advantage to all parts of the country and will doubtless cause many from the east to visit the various localities mentioned.

The SENTINEL has been sold to Mr. N. Langell, of Jacksonville, for \$1,225. It is understood that Mr. Langell will take editorial charge at once, and endeavor to build the paper up to the position it should occupy as one of the oldest journals in Oregon. Hayes, manager of the Western Union Telegraph Company, was attacked by a footpad near his residence on Fifteenth and C streets at 6 o'clock Sunday night and was dealt a blow on the head with a small sized sandbag. He turned upon his assailant and landed a left hander in the face whereupon the footpad took to heels and disappeared. He evidently thought he was struck by lightning.—[News.]

It has been said so long that nobody dared to dispute it that "Old men for counsel and young men for war" was the right way to mix it. But the current report from the army is to the effect that most of the sickness amongst the tropics of men under thirty. The soldiers over that age stand the hardships of peace in the barracks with unflinching courage, while the youngsters are howling in hospital.

Joseph Rapp, of Wagner creek, is setting out more winter apple trees on his profitable farm near Talent, and was in town last Saturday after the trees. He thinks the people of this valley make a great mistake in sending away for their fruit trees, and thus introducing the various orchard pests which are so pernicious and destructive in California and the Eastern States, and even in the Willamette valley now.—[Tidings.]

While some of our town boys were hunting ducks on Rogue river, opposite Table Rock this week, they discovered a large deer with a heavy head of horns, standing on the bank of the river. They approached so close to him as to be able to fire into him with their shot guns, which they did. The deer plunged into the river and swam to the opposite shore. When he came out, he gave evident signs of being badly wounded.

Apple trees are often starved in other ways than by neglect to manure. The apple borer leads to starvation oftener than poor soil. The supply of food is cut off by every move the borer makes. Get the borer out somehow, even if by wire and jack-knife. If not soon done they will quickly get themselves out, and after they have left be sure to keep them out. Paper put on in May and then tarred with tar or printer's ink will keep them out. One paper will last three years.

The latest from the railroad front says the "Journal," is that 700 graders and 100 carts are now near the Salt works, about 6 miles from here, to commence work in grading at Shasta river crossing, which indicates that the road will continue along the survey about 6 miles east of Yreka. The best move our people can now make is to build a branch, in order to have direct communication with the main line, and by so doing prevent the building of more than the solitary depot at any other point.

We are sorry to say that Mrs. Myers of Salt creek, has lost her right mind. She was taken sick last March, and has been quite low at times. The character of her sickness was a varying one: about four months ago, she seemed to be regaining strength, at the same time, however, it was noticed her mind was approaching the precipice of insanity; finally she became quite strong, physically, and perfectly insane. She was taken to Salem the other day, where we hope her mind will soon be restored to its normal state. Surely the relatives have the sympathy of all.

The railroad forces at the Salt Works, near town, indicate that the railroad company means business in closing up the gap between Ashland and Strawberry Valley as speedily as possible, and the promise of reaching the vicinity of Yreka by New Year's is likely to be fulfilled. In a couple of weeks more the iron horse may trot his whistle within sight of us, so that 40 miles more of railroad north of Soda Springs will be ready for acceptance by the government, which will enable us to reach San Francisco in a trip of less than 12 hours.—[Journal.]

When the railroad boom gets under full headway in Northern California, we anticipate several cross roads westward and eastward from this county, which seems to be the most available outlet for Eastern Oregon, and the vast extent of country along the Klamath river and late Humboldt county on the Pacific Ocean. The cutting rates overland by the Southern Pacific last Spring, with such disastrous effect on the Eastern roads, has caused the Eastern and Northern Pacific roads, to have full lines of their own in one combination, to compete with the Southern Pacific and Canadian Pacific on all the main trunk routes.—[Journal.]

Woman suffrage and jury duty in Washington Territory begin to tell on the domestic life of that jurisdiction. A husband writes: "My wife has been gone away on the jury four days. I have not had a square meal since she left. My children are crying for bread, and everything goes wrong. I am hungry, angry and all out of sorts in every respect. I write this to warn the people that whoever advocates woman's rights in my presence again must be a very large man, and if ever the sheriff comes after my wife again he had better bring a posse with him, for my shotgun is loaded, and I will not hesitate to use it."

PRISONERS EN ROUTE.—Two more government prisoners arrived here yesterday on the Atlantic express on the way to the United States penitentiary, at McNeil's island, on Puget sound. They came from Colfax, and are in custody of F. W. Goodhue, deputy United States marshal. Conn Murray is the name of one of the prisoners, and his offense is that of selling liquor to Indians. He is under sentence for five months. The second prisoner is one Marion Wilson, who has been convicted of passing counterfeit money (twenty spurious dollar pieces being found in his possession) and sentenced to three months.—[Oregonian.]
