Martha Montgomery Burnett was born in Crawford county, Missouri, near St. Louis, Feb. 26, 1832, and passed her life from youth to womanhood in Wright county, not far distant from the place of her nativity. She crossed the plains to Oregon in 1853 with her parents and settled in Round Prairie, Douglas county.

Dec. 11, 1854, she was married to Michael Hanley, who though a hopeless invalid from softening of the brain, survives her. In April, 1857, Mr. and Mrs. Hanley removed to Jackson county and settled on a farm near Jacksonville. Here nine children were born to them, three of them, two daughters and a son, dying within a few weeks of each other in the year 1866—a bereavement that was lifelong in its duration to the tender mother's heart.

Three years since Mrs. Hanley's health became seriously impaired with bronchial affection, which soon developed a pulmonary tendency. This so seriously alarmed her family that she was prevailed upon to spend the following winter in Los Angeles, California, but deriving no permanent beneficial results from the change, the devoted wife returned to her home and loved ones, where she gradually declined in health. July 8th, of this year, she was baptized into the Presbyterian church, following an oft repeated desire to become a communicant of that church, from which she had been prevented by various circumstances. Oct. 14, 1887, she passed peacefully away in the full assurance of the christian faith, and surrounded by her children, all of whom were with her but her son Edward, who is at present at Burns, Grant county.

Mrs. Hanley endeavored herself to a large circle of friends by her many estimable traits of character, and her children evidenced their devoted love for her in their tireless and unremitting care of her during her long illness. Few parents have been so tenderly and affectionately cared for, and have thus attested their own worth, in the good qualities of head and heart that are the blessed inheritance of their children. Dr. Pryce, the attending physician, won for himself the gratitude of her friends in the skillful and careful treatment of her disease and the uniform kindness and attention he gave her in her hopeless illness. The funeral took place from the family residence on Sunday, Oct. 16th, with services at the Presbyterian church, conducted, by special request of the deceased, by Rev. M. A. Williams, Jacksonville's old-time beloved pastor. Tenderly and lovingly the venerable minister eulogized the dead, paying well merited tribute to the beauty and worth of her character, as wife, mother and friend, afterwards rendering solemn and impressive funeral services, from Revelations, 14th chapter and 13th verse.

Another home is made desolate by the merciless reaper, death, but beyond thimonia and sorrows of earthly separations, heavenly reunions are beckoning us to eternal rest; and to the bereaved family and friends we tender our sincere sympathy, trusting that the dark shadows of the present may be followed by the blessed realization of God's promise to never leave or forsake them, and may the memory of the devoted mother's love be the guiding star to children and grand children, as the years roll on in their ceaseless course to eternity.

The mysterious messenger, death, has visited another happy household, and called hence from the scene of her earthly love and labor the beloved wife of our fellow-townman, James G. Birdsey. Another home is made desolate, and three little ones—the eldest a bright boy of 4 years and the youngest a babe of two months—are left to realize the greatest of all desolations, a life that never knew the tender self-sacrificing love of a mother. Mrs. Kate Ruth Birdsey was born on Humboldt creek in Jackson county, when she passed the blissful years of innocent childhood. She had the misfortune to be left an entire orphan in the tender years of her girlhood when most in need of protecting parental care. She came to Jacksonville soon after her orphanage to make her home with strangers, where she endeavored herself to a large circle of friends by her purity of character and social genial worth.

She was happily married to James G. Birdsey Nov. 11th, 1882. Their life, which was crowned by the love of little children, was peaceful and happy. They had made for themselves a pleasant home with comfortable surroundings, and their future was bright with its halo of promise, when, all to soon, out of the cloudless sky the death angel swept his desolating pall over the sunny little homestead and the sweet young wife and mother was called hence to rest in the dreamless sleep of the grave. Mrs. Birdsey met with an accident about one year since by the overturning of a cart, which at the time threatened her death. She rallied, however, and her friends hoped that all danger was past, but about three months since she became sick and her symptoms developed such alarming tendencies that her recovery was soon despaired of, and she gradually grew worse until Oct. 15, 1887, when she died peacefully in the arms of the husband whose life she had blessed for so short a time with her love and companionship.

She paid a beautiful tribute to her mother-in-law in her cool and unflinching courage in her care and training, her three little ones, as she was calmly anticipating the hour of separation and final dissolution, and only those who know and love Mrs. D. N. Birdsey can realize how capable she is to accept and discharge so sacred and important a trust. She was buried in the Red Men's cemetery. Rev. M. A. Williams conducting the funeral services at the grave. Only those who have stood at the grave of their own loved ones in the anguish of life's first great bereavement can fully sympathize with the bereft husband as he gathered his motherless babes to his bosom and called in vain on the loved one to come back to them. May the God of the fatherless watch over the bereaved ones, while autumn leaves fall in golden mantle over the new made grave of the departed, and the blessed sunlight of christian hope and consolation find an abiding place in their lives and hearts.
