

VARIOUS NEWS ITEMS.

HOMICIDES.—The *Cdroicile* publishes a table of Homicides in California for the last eleven months, which foots up five hundred and thirty-four, or forty-eight and six-elevenths per month.

In the first quarter the total numbered 129

" second " 99

" third " 208

October and Nov. (just passed), 107

Total 334

Hung by Sheriff in the last 11 months. 7

Hung by the people 49

The above is a terrible record. It is rum and the rum traffic, and the practice of carrying concealed weapons which spreads these blood spots on our soil. CASE OF CORA.—Cora was arraigned last week for the murder of Gen. Richardson. He appeared with a great array of council, and what mean art one would not use another could. After considerable debate and finessing, the indictment was broken down in consequence of two defects in the proceeding:

1. The omission of the date of the venire for the Grand Jury; and 2. The omission of the name of the Court in the title of the indictment, although inserted in the body of the bill.

The Court in sustaining the demur to the indictment, ordered that the case be remitted to the Grand Jury, and the prisoner remained to custody.

So the master will stand till the meeting of the next Grand Jury in January, in the meantime rumors are ripe that the witnesses against Cora are being bribed to leave the country.—*Christian Advocate*.

NOVEL CASE OF HAREAS CORPUS.—Some days since a Chinaman, who spoke tolerable English, hired a teamster to haul a load of disinterred Celestial bodies to some other place of sepulture. (They have been taking up and collecting together all their dead along the river.) The number of defunct to be loaded was not stipulated, and the teamster found his wagon overloaded, so that he could not get up the hill. He demanded extra pay to hire more cattle, but John insisted on having him go without either, refusing to pay anything except on delivery of the ghoulish cargo. Became very wroth, the teamster swore he would sell cargo to pay freight, and just then a doctor happened to pass with whom he negotiated a sale—"one man ten dollars"—and the doctor was about to remove his purchase, which the teamster had hauled out by his leg. This proceeding caused the supercargo's saffron visage to elongate amazingly, and he "forked over" the extra pay without further parley.—[Sierra Citizen.]

DISCOVERY OF COAL AT SAN DIEGO.—Messrs. Ladd, Green, Tanner and Serrine have made the discovery that a coal bed exists on the shore of the Pacific, about two miles north of Point Loma. The coal has been tested by some of our citizens, and is found to burn with a clear, bright flame, apparently without odor, and giving out intense heat. On being tried at a blacksmith's forge, it is found applicable to welding and other processes where great heat is required. The land has been leased for a term of fifteen years, and a stock company is being formed to work the bed.

BUFFALO DEVOURING ALL THE GRASS ON THE PRAIRIES.—Buffaloes in innumerable numbers are ranging over the prairies only fifteen miles west of Fort Riley. With a spy-glass, from a hill, they can be seen grazing as far as the eye can reach. Settlers who have located in the vicinity with herds of cattle have been compelled to remove, for the want of grass, which has been consumed by those animals. The Potawatomi Indians paid a visit to them last week, and bro't back in a couple of days all the meat they could haul away, leaving the skins and fore quarters on the ground. They are making preparations for another hunt.—*Kansas Herald of Freedom*, July 14.

A correspondent in England says:—"A story goes the rounds, which I cannot vouch for as being more than a report. It is said that the Sultan has been so struck with the fact of English ladies charitably devoting themselves to the good of the soldiers as they have done here, that he came to the conclusion it must be 'their Book,' which made such a difference between them and the Turkish females. So he has begun to read the Bible, in order to compare its teaching with that of the Koran."

The New York *Courier* counts up the bodily value of \$40,000 immigrants, 100,000 of them able-bodied laborers, worth \$1,500 each—at \$150,000,000; and the money they bring as being \$50 each, \$17,000,000 in all. It may safely be said then, it adds, that the commercial worth of the immigration to the country this year was \$167,000,000—a sum equal to three-fourths of the value of all our exports.
