PROBABLY LOST.—A dispatch of recent date has this: "The electoral vote of Georgia is probably lost to Hancock and English, for the following reasons: The revised statutes of the United States provide, section 135 that the electoral college of the several States shall meet on the first Wednesday in December and cast the vote. A GRAND ENTERPRISE.

According to Poor's Manual the miles of railroad operating in the ten States of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, Kansas and Nebraska, aggregate about 40,380; the cost of constructing and equipping was about \$1,900,000,000; the annual gross earnings about \$218,000,000; and the net earnings nearly \$93,000,000. The net earnings of the railroads of Illinois alone exceeded, in 1879, \$30,000,000, and the 6,380 miles in Ohio report a net earning of nearly \$20,000,000. The enterprise and energy of our capitalists, and their faith in the future of this country, have been exhibited to a greater degree in this matter of railroad building than in any other of the enterprises which have placed the United States foremost among the nations of the world.

Inebriation among women in England is sadly prevalent and still increasing. Some of the pen pictures of actual occurrences in fashionable society as drawn by the London press are really painful to contemplate, describing, as they do, the degraded condition into which ladies of high station and culture are fast reducing their circles of society. NATIONAL FINANCES.

(PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.)

The condition of the financial affairs of the government as shown by the report of the secretary of the treasury is very satisfactory. It is believed that the present financial situation of the United States, whether considered with respect to trade, currency, credit, growing wealth, or extent and variety of our resources, is more favorable than that of any country at any time, and never has been surpassed by that of any country at any time.

The amount due the sinking fund for this year was \$37,931,613. There was applied thereto the sum of \$73,904,617, being \$35,972,973 in excess of actual requirements for the year. The aggregate total of the sinking fund during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1880, was \$333,526,610, an increase over the preceding year of \$5,939,441.26.
