

PACIFIC COASTERS.

Baker City has a population of 1,199.
Pugot Sound mills pay \$7 per thousand for logs.
Stock, north of Pendleton on the Columbia is reported as losing much flesh.
Himehick, in jail at Albany, for killing Ray last October, now claims the shooting was accidental.
Repairs are being made to the North Canton bridge, and a breakwater is to be constructed just above it.
Cattle in the Antelope country and Wallawa valley died in large numbers during the cold spell.
A Chinaman stole \$1,100 from Henry Stock at Milwaukie, a few days ago, has been arrested and is now awaiting trial.
It will require one and one-half millions of brick to put up the proposed new buildings at Spokane Falls the coming summer.
Hank Vaughn and party are grazing 300 head of horses on Unatilla reservation previous to driving them into the British possessions.
Superintendent Hallet has over 1,000 men at work on the branch of the Northern Pacific railroad.
The end of the track is now at the 350-mile post.
The Dayton "Chronicle" says: Noah Hayden who has been packing pork for Kinney Morris & Co., showed as the result of his labors this week. Up to date he has killed 200 hogs, and he has on hand about 20 tons of as fine meat as we have ever seen, and 4,000 pounds of lard. When we state that this 300-ton lot of pork will cost consumers near \$7,000, it will be seen that pork packing might be made a paying business. Farmers who "turn off" a few hogs each year generally are satisfied with their experience and are repeating it.
From Mr. John Bailey, jr., the Walls Walla "Statesman" learns that by the first of March stages will make connection with the Oregon Short Line at Shoshone City, 128 miles from Boise City, instead of at Kellon, as at present. The saving of time will be one day between Kellon and Boise, and the stage will connect with the cars four and one-half days after leaving Walls Walla. Engineers of the company speak in favor of the route via Lewiston rather than through the Grand Ronde, and they will advise the adoption of that route.
