BLUFF STREET. - At a special meeting of the City Council, held on Monday evening, an ordinance was passed providing for the establishment of the grade of Bluff street, from Second street to Seventh street. Buff street runs north and south parallel with, and east of Main street. It is very desirable that it should be graded and improved, to conform with the Main street of the city. All property along the street will receive its proportionate increase of value by such a movement. The afley running through block 26 was ordered to be graded and McAdamized, and eventually all streets and alley-ways leading to Bluff street, will be similarly improved. By these indications it will be seen that capital is accumulating, and population increasing, in Oregon City. The improvement of streets o is a consequent sign of prosperity, and where a community is found improving its streets and highways, inquiries are more frequently made regarding the opportunities to invest money. Oregon City has done very well, since the time it was settled, with one street, but now it is found that we want more streets even, than there is accomedation for on the lower "bench." Very many sites for residences have been selected upon the bluff, and High street has of late obtained quite noted popularity. When we removed our household goods to this city from Portland, a short time since, we were unable to obtain any kind of a tenement in which to live, and allowed our "treight" to remain in the P. T. Company's warehouse until a house was built for us. Since then at least a dozen houses, some of which are equal in point of style to the best, have been started, or finished, on the bluff. In every case they are owned by the parties who reside in them, or contemplate residing in them. The population of Oregon City is of that class generally which may be considered permanent. They are at home, and realize that come what may, no change in human allairs can move their support, the manufacturing interests, away from Oregon City, hence they are at nome. As these new streets are opened, and their grades, become established, men will see that the best investment they can the better consider themselves permanent residents here.
