FLOUR SHIPMENTS TO THE EAST .- The San Francisco agent of the Pacific Mail Steampower to encourage the people to make lib-eral shipments of Flour via the Isthmus. The charges for small lots is \$1 75 gold per 100 lbs. But contract rates for round lots, neatly put up in bags and covered with gun-nies, \$1 50 per 100 lbs., or say to New York, \$3 per barrel, in gold. At this rate of freight, extra Flour can be sold in New York, to cover, at \$15 per barrel, currency. It will be remembered that an enterprising merchant of San Francisco recently shipped 225 barrels as an experiment. The flour arrived in good order, and his agent was of-fered \$15 50 per bbl, for it, but refused the offer, as he could do better by sending it to Philadelphia. At the price offered it would return a fair profit on the money invested. This speculation rather reverses the order of things as they existed only a few years ago. The Pacific States can now supply New York with flour as cheap as the Western States. But little more than ten years ago California depended for her bread upon foreign countries. The merchant referred to has since sent 500 barrels, which has probably reached New York by this time. Our information regarding the San Francisco wheat and flour markets, is that prices are drooping. This will afford better facilities to shippers East, but when we add that prices of freight from Portland to Sau Francisco are tending to an advance, it affords little consolation to the farmers of Oregon who have interest amid a hope of disposing of their surplus. The matter of packing flour in barrels is becoming quite an imp portant feature, and we believe that the Imperial Mills of this cityswere the first to undertake it. Wagons, loaded with barrels, pass through our streets almost daily, and some of these may find their way East. We are sure that no better flour is made than that which they will contain.

LUMBERING COMPANIES .-- On a recent visit to Canemah we promised to speak more in relation to the works of the Canemah Lum-

bering Company, George Johnson, Joseph Hedges and J. T. Taylor, Directors. The mill of this company is a large one, with a capacity for sawing from 5,000 to 7,000 feet Francisco agent of the Pacine Mail Steam-ship Company seems disposed to do all in his from one of the portable engines of Wood & Mann's patent, thirty horse-power, and the saws, of which there are two, (circular,) are adapted to cutting a log of any diameter such as may be found about here. The company also have one of Putnam's patent planing machines, which will dress lumber five inches thick by 24 inches in width. The mill of this company is 80 by 40 feet in size, built of timbers 14 inches square, in a very solid and substantial manner. The mill of Messrs. Muler & Pease, recently com-S. pleted on the western side of the P. T. Company's breakwater, derives its power from a water-wheel. It has a capacity for furnishing from 5,000 to 7,000 feet per day. This company manufacture a large quantity of boxes for packing apples, and soon a lath machine, and saws for making into wood the slabs of the mill, will be in operation. The saws used for lumbering are circular, and one of Woodward's patent plainers is employed. We have been unable to visit the faill of W. & H. S. Buck, on the Clackamas, but shall do so soon. We have no correct knowledge of the number of mills in the county, although there are several. The Oswego milling company have facilities for manufacturing an average of 7,000 feet daily for the year. The lumber of this company is principally disposed of in Portland. That of the three companies previously mentioned is principally sold and consumed in this city.

WASHINGTON TERRITORY.- Governor Pickering, in his message to the legislature of Washington Territory, points to valuable agricultural lands on various outrageously named streams, aggregating 1.318 miles of rich alluvial bottoms yet remaining unde-veloped, and rarely visited by white men, which is capable of furnishing 20,000 families with 160 acres each. 




