**CRUISING HAMS.**—Massachusetts Hams writes: "I cure and smoke 50,000 to 100,000 pieces per year, and know my business. Meat cured in pickle made of water is not as good, and only used because more profitable and less laborious. The flavor of cured meats depends mainly on the quality of molasses used. The best temperature is 40°; frozen meat will not cure, and, if above 50°, will be liable to taint. For 100 lbs. of meat take 8 lbs. salt and 1 quart best molasses, or 2 lbs. sugar, 3/4 lb. saltpeter, 2 ounces ground alum; mix and rub on the fleshy side of the meat, placed in pans so as to keep all the mixture; repeat the rubbing every three days, rubbing in thoroughly. For large pieces and cold weather, six days will be required; if mild weather, fifty days; and fifteen days less for small pieces. The skin and fat of hams should be cut clean from the face as far down as the second joint, to allow the salt to enter. The recipe for keeping meat in ashes, given in September *Agriculturist*, is good. Smoking is of no benefit; it is only a quick way of drying. Most people would prefer drying without smoke, use only walnut or yellow birch wood, or mahogany saw-dust. Be sure your meat is well cooled off before salting; ten days after killing is better than ten hours."  
**FEVER AND AGUE.**—If anybody wants a perfect remedy, and no quinine, for fever and ague, J. E. Tows, Medina Ohio, is ready to furnish it upon the receipt of \$2 and he hopes this proposition may meet with a kind reception as he is in need of the money. Such propositions are always received kindly. We are ever glad of the opportunity to gratuitously advertise quack medicines. But with our present knowledge of the curative value of quinine, and our lack of information, whether this substitute may or may not be some thing worse, we shall keep our \$2, and advise others to do the same. Mr. LEICH, Antwerp, says: "Quinine is good or bad just as it is used. The following receipt, I know, will cure the ague: 20 grains quinine, 15 grains of powdered gum myrrh, 10 grains of extract of liquorice; mix with a little oil of sassafras, make in to 20 pills, drying them in sassafras bark ground fine. Take one pill every hour until all are used."  
**SAFETY IS GOOD MEAT.**—Occasionally we witness the most serious diarrhea and prostration of vital power by the use of diseased meat. It is well, therefore, to be certified of the appearance of good flesh. When good meat is examined under the microscope, the fiber is found to be clear and well defined and free from infusorial creatures; but that of diseased meat is sodden, as if it had been soaked in water; and the transverse markings are indistinct and far apart; beside which there are often minute organisms like infusorial bodies. These are very perceptible in the flesh of animals affected with the cattle plague and Dr. Beale has described them as entozoon-like objects. They differ altogether from the parasites which constitute the Trichina disease and the measles of pork. It is far better to have the meat a little overcooked than undercooked.  
**SOLUBLE METALS.**—As an interesting corollary of our latest knowledge of the sodium amalgam, we may state that Mennel has found that the oxys of mercury, cadmium and bismuth are all soluble in melted potash and soda, and magnesium baryta, strontia and lime were all readily dissolved in fused potash. These solutions of the metallic earths themselves, also dissolve many of the metals and raise them to a high state of oxidation.

**PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS FROM A PRACTICAL MAN.**—Thomas Mooney, President of the San Francisco Building and Loan Society, also President of the Builder's Insurance Company of San Francisco, we happen to know is a thoroughly practical man. He is not well liked by the snob aristocracy, and purse-proud of the immaculate San Francisco, hence we are not surprised that the following from his pen appears as an advertisement in the *Bulletin*. We would cheerfully publish all such communications gratuitously, and consider that we were conferring a favor upon the human family:  
**To The Managers of The Industrial School.**  
The Directors of the Builders' Insurance Company donate twenty five dollars (enclosed) towards the cost of the piano forte which is being presented to the Industrial School. I take the liberty of indicating an opinion respecting the system of education prevalent. My idea is, that every school should be an industrial school. Too much "learning" and too little work is taught, it would be well if boys and girls, while young, were thoroughly impressed with the notion that they are to do some work in this world, and must do that work well. But they are not taught to work, well or ill; they are not taught to work at all. The present system weans them away from all thoughts of industry. The new generation will appear on the stage of life full-blown "ladies" and "gentlemen"—walking gentlemen and walking ladies, who will despise work of any kind, and look upon the use of the hands in any sort of labor as vulgar, and fit only for Chinamen. This tendency to idleness is nothing new. It prevailed in the latter ages of the Roman Empire; and having generated in the State, an idle class and a slave class—the patrician and the plebeian—ended in civil wars and the dissolution of the Empire. If you permit this pernicious seed to take root here it is likely to produce like results. The Press and the Pulpit might avert this.  
Industrial schools, with good sized farms attached, should be established outside this city, where botany and the chemistry connected with manufactures and agriculture, for practical purposes for every day life, can be taught. How few of our educated boys could raise good vegetables from the earth, and how precious few of our educated girls could cook them if raised, and yet good vegetables ought to form the largest portion of our daily food—far more nutritious are they than rich meats.  
Again, how few of our educated boys know aught about the construction of a house or ship or the machinery for a factory, and yet a good knowledge of carpentry and of naval architecture, etc., would enable the proficient student to earn a good living by these branches of labor. Our "educated" generation now growing up will be a very helpless generation indeed. They will rely upon foreigners for almost everything they shall want. The little boys and girls born amid the hills of Switzerland will make their watches; the youth of the Rhine valleys will supply them with wine and toys; the children in the Belgian villages will supply them with lace; the boys and girls of the Massachusetts villages will make their boots and shoes, while the educated youth of France will lay them under enormous tribute for silks and frippery. And so our little boys and girls must find money—money at all hazards, to support the little boys and girls of other nations who are better educated.  
This is one of the ways of the money-drift; and the virtue and industry that go to make up a great nation will melt away from year to year until the idle class join together to tax and oppress the poor, and of course the poor will resist, and come civil war again.  
Parents would do well to think seriously over these remarks, and to keep them before their children.
