

TOWN AND COUNTY.

LAND OFFICE CHANGES.—Mr. Wade, of the Land Office in this city, has handed us the following notice of the creation of the La Grande district, in the State of Oregon, and change of boundaries of the Roseburg and Oregon City land districts, which has been received from J. M. Edmunds, Commissioner of the General Land Office: "Notice is hereby given, that in pursuance of the act of Congress approved July 3, 1866, the President of the United States has directed that an additional land district be organized in the State of Oregon, to be composed of that portion of the Northern (Oregon City) district lying between its eastern boundary and the meridional line separating Townships 22 and 23 east, with office located at LeGrand, in Union County. Public notice of the day on which this office will be opened for the transaction of business will be given by the Register and Receiver. It is further directed by the President, that that portion of the Oregon City land district included between the 3d and 4th standards parallel south, and extending from the Pacific Ocean east to the summit of the Cascade mountains, be attached to and become a part of the Roseburg district. The Register and Receiver at Roseburg will give public notice of the day on which they will be prepared to receive applications for the entry of vacant lands situated within the attached area."

PERSONAL.—Capt. Kellogg yesterday marshaled a host of our Portland friends in upon the steamer "Reliance." There were Capt. Flanders, Messrs. C. Hills, J. B. Biles, W. K. Withers, and P. W. DeHoff, all hale and hearty. Capt. F. and Mr. Biles, who are less familiar with the rapid progress of Oregon City than the other gentlemen named, express themselves highly gratified with their visit to the embryo Lowell. A day can now be well spent in looking through our various manufacturing establishments, at the works of Falls, and the extensive works of the Transportation Company.

CAPT. G. A. PERRY.—The Health of Sunday, after announcing that the fleet of the People's Transportation Company above this city, was in the Basin, paid our fellow townsman, Capt. Geo. A. Perry, the following tribute: "Were it not for the industry of Capt. Geo. A. Perry of the favorite steamer 'Reliance,' our river communication with Salem and the points above would have been totally cut off. Capt. George has on the river for years, and besides knowing every inch of the bottom, he has the nerve to put a steamer through any place where there is water to float her."

ACCIDENTS.—Mr. Wm. Newman, an employee of the People's Transportation Company at this city, met with a serious accident on Tuesday last, by falling while engaged in moving a plank. He fell from the upper deck, a distance of something like fourteen feet, and was so badly hurt that he had to be carried away. He was provided with a room at the Cliff for weeks, where medical assistance was obtained, and on Wednesday was taken to his residence, on Bluff street. We are pleased to learn that he is improving.

REAL ESTATE CHANGES.—Within the past week considerable land in this county has changed hands. Parties have purchased an eligible site at Oswego for a tip top hotel. And in this city one of the most valuable privileges for manufacturing purposes on the entire coast, is about ready to be assigned over to gentlemen whose able management and shrewd tact is sufficient guarantee that they will shortly convert it to practical use.

THE LOCAL PAPER.—The following truthful remarks we take from the Clatsop Republican: "Whether the people will it or not, the local paper is their representative abroad, their ambassador in foreign ports, by which they must be judged. Let them, then, take a patriotic interest in giving it necessary co-operation and patronage. Like every other duty performed, it will pay in the long run."

AGAIN AT THE WHEEL.—Capt. John Apperson, first commander of the Steamer "Aetna," is now on deck of the "Union," plying between this city and Lafayette. His old friends, many of them prominent shippers on the upper river, will be pleased to meet him again occasionally. On Tuesday he reported high water in the Yamhill.

THE CLIFF HOUSE.—Card of this new and elegantly finished hotel, appears elsewhere to-day. Now, with the Cliff House and Barlow House, now need be, as in times past, afraid to drop in and stay over night with us. Give the Cliff House a trial. ALFOYS.—The lower portions of land between this city and Clackamas are almost wholly flooded. In the event of this becoming the important city we all expect, it will be necessary to expend a few thousands for levee purposes in that direction. We hear of no damage caused by the flood, as most people were prepared for it.

FLOOD BROKEN.—The high water in Clear Creek, on Tuesday last, carried away a portion of the floor, at Harding's grist mill, which has necessitated stoppage of work for a short time, until the water recedes sufficient to allow repairs to be made.

L. PARRISH & CO.—Mr. E. M. Burton, of Portland, has been admitted as a partner in the firm of J. L. Parrish & Co. The house will lose none of its fair name by that move. Mr. Burton is one of Oregon's best men.

THE NEXT STATE FAIR.—We have received one-half, we suppose, of the list of premiums to be awarded at the next annual Fair of the State Agricultural Society. Mr. John Magone of Oregon City, appears as superintendent of the committee on cattle. Mr. Thos. Rowley, as one of the committee on sheep. We hope the management of the fair this year will be better than for years past. But in the beginning we have something to find fault about. They should place at the head of the list of premiums the time of the fair. According to our understanding last week, the fair was to have been held in September, beginning on the 10th day, and continuing for five days, but according to this half a programme, it is to take place "October 1867." We decline publishing the list until we can do so understandingly. If this fair is to be like the previous ones, we shall most respectfully decline having anything to do with it anyhow.

THE CHRISTIAN COLLEGE.—A few days since we had the pleasure of making the acquaintance of Dr. N. Hudson, Professor of mathematics and natural science, of the above college, located at Monmouth, in Lane county. The prospects of the college which appears elsewhere in our columns, will show that this institution is on a basis which is well adapted for the promotion of practical education. We trust that the Trustees may meet with unbounded success in their work, and to do this we shall cheerfully lend them our humble influence, so far as it goes.

OSWEGO.—We were shown the plat of Oswego a few days since by the proprietor, Mr. J. C. Trullinger.
