In America, owing to the high rate of wages and the difficulty of obtaining an adequate supply of labor, agricultural muchinery calcu lated to save manual labor has been be harvested, and without the thresh to market. Hence the trade in agr cultural implements has reached gigantic proportions. From inquiries I made I found that at least 100,000 reaping and mowing machines are made annually in the States. I ago. The threshing machines were very inferior to ours, though the Americans were apt to think that they were far ahead of us, and that we were a very slow people ; their machines were almost exclusively worked by horse power. One farm. er on the banks of Lake Ontario, who had 10 horses yoked to his threshing machine, seemed much surprised that in England we did all our threshing by steam power. He had never heard of such a thing. The implements of the farm, if we except reapers, are of very inferior design and built to our English machines. I thought one great want in American farming was the good steerage drills and horse hoes to follow.
