DEODORIZATION OF VULCANIZED RUBBER.—The offensive sulphurous smell of india rubber goods is a serious drawback upon their other-wise great convenience.

EXTRACT OF HEMLOCK BARK.—In the northern part of Maine great quantities of hemlock abound, but the distaste to tanneries is so great that the transportation consumes all the profits of the bark.

PROFITS FROM HENS.—The editor of the Maine Farmer has kept hens for the last thirty years. He has furnished them with hen houses, poles to roost on, boxes to lay in, food of best quality, and everything in first class order.

PRESERVATION OF MILK.—The germs that ferment the milk are not destroyed by ordinary boiling, but if the milk be boiled under a pressure of about 22 lbs to the inch, he asserts their destruction is effected; after which the milk may be preserved in air-tight cans for any length of time.

CRANBERRIES—Six acres of meadow in the town of Mansfield, Conn. recently, were carefully prepared and stocked with cranberry plants three or four years ago.

NEW ARTIFICIAL SOLID.—Gypsum, if mixed with a certain quantity of water and soaked in a bath of hot pitch, parts with its water, and absorbing pitch in corresponding quantity, forms a substance so hard that it will receive a polish, and can be used in the manufacture of useful and ornamental articles.

ABOUT GRAPES.—In a recent address Mr. A. S. Fuller, author of the Grape Culturist, says he has long since come to the conclusion that there is very little positive knowledge connected with grape culture, and what there is, was and is obtained by local experience.

DOMESTIC ANIMALS.—Although the territory of the United States is so much greater than England, the live stock is by no means in the same proportion. The cows and other horned cattle, according to the census of 1860, amounted to 17,000,000 about double the estimated number of the United Kingdom—two and one-fourth million of the cattle were returned as working oxen. The sheep, on the other hand, fell short of the estimated English number by two and one-half millions; while the pigs exceeded by ten times our number, reaching the fabulous number of 33,000,000, or just about as many pigs as people.
