The iron has never been worked except by the vi age black smith who has I believe manuactured a horse shoe from it, using the neighboring coal in his forge. An iron field similar to this one has been purchased by a com pany of which W. S. Ladd of Portland, is resident. The capital stock of this company is \$ 00 000, and their turnaces are now so near completion that it is expected work will be commenced next July. These iron works are located at Oswego. in clack mas county, five in les north of O. g m Usy, on the Williamet e river. 1 have been told by ex Gov. Gibbs that e maliy good ir m, i. e., so pure that it is ratileable in the ore, can be found in U ni qua county.

The salt of Oregon is obtained from springs and is of very superior quality. The springs are numerous in the western pare or heal noman county, in the valley of the Lower Willamette, in Columbia county, adjoining and also in Louglas county or the Umpqua vailey. Those in Douglas county bave been worked for some time, manufacturing about 1 000 pounds per day, which being consumed in the neighborhood of the works, does not oder lised in the Fortland market; nether would the distance and difficulties of springs in different counties worked in a small way. But it is of the salt works facely erected in the Lower Willamette Valley that I have been able to gather most information. These are situated half way be ween Portland and St. Heien, at the ioo, or the hills which skirt the pale face.
