In other words stop the hole through which we are losing our money. dam the river which is carrying our gold away from us, and exercise your best judgement in selecting the means to do it with.

No community can become wealthy and independent which depends alone upon the productions of the raw material. To be truly prosperous and independent every State, should do as near as possible all her own manufacturing.
