DANIEL HARVEY VS. OREGON CITY COUNCIL, ETC.—This case which was also taken under advisement by Judge Shattuck...

CIRCUIT COURT—Daniel Harvey vs. the City Council of Oregon City, and Wm. P. Barnes, Assessor.

This case having been submitted upon the amended pleadings the evidence and argument of counsel, the court finds...

That the said Daniel Harvey being dissatisfied with the assessment of his property for the city taxation, applied by petition to the City Council for a reduction...

That the City Council appointed a committee to examine the matter of the plaintiff's petition, which committee went upon the ground, and made examination...

That the subject matter of the petition, and the report was debated at that time and finally postponed.

That at the next meeting it was brought up again in the form of a resolution, and debate proposition to reduce plaintiff's assessment \$10,000, and such reduction made in his assessment, and proportionally in that of the other parties.

That the said City Council did not act capriciously or fraudulently in refusing to reduce said assessment more than \$10,000, and they did not act in violation of the Constitution...

That the valuation established by said Council was made upon their judgment of what the property was worth, and if erroneous; it was an error or mistake simply...

That this court has no jurisdiction to grant the relief prayed for or any relief. That the injunction should be discharged, and the plaintiff's complaint dismissed.
