How to take care of a Piano. - We copy the following plain and simple directions for the proper care of pianos from a cotemporary: It should be rememberd that the pianoforte, is susceptible to the change of temperature, and when tuned in one temperature will be out of tune in another. Good and well made piano-fortes will stand in tune if they are uned at proper periods. Many people, as they wish to avoid expense, will let their instruments remain long out of tune, which is a great detriment to them, as they are less likely to stand well after having been so left. We will offer a few hints in reference to the matter. A piano-forte ought justly to be tuned twice a year, at least. First, when you commence with a fire in the room; second when a fire is discontinued. EXTRACTING PERFUME.—The bisulphide quid, of a foetid smell, readily dissolv s the essential oils of flowers to which they owe their agreeable odor. M. Schnaiter's process for obtaining perfumes is to fill a large phial with the petals, just gathered, of the flower he wants to operate upon. and having poured upon them a sufficient quantity of bisulphide of carbon (sulphuret of carbon) to cork the phial. shake it, and let it stand. The bisulphide penetrates into the substance of the petals and expels the water they contain which goes to the bottom. After six days' m asceration the bisulphide of carbon charged with the essential oil of the flowers is decanted into another phial containing fresh flowers, and this operation is repeated four times, after which, if the quantity of flowers is considerable the bisulphide will be mighty colored. It is now necessary to separate the bisulphide from the perabout eighty-three per cent. This process can be performed by any farmer's daughter, but when the amount to be made is very large the oil of almonds should be added to the saturated bisulphide and the whole distilled at a very low temperature, so as to save the bisulphide, and the residue is treated with alcohol as before described.

PRESERVATION OF FLOWERS.—At several fairs of the American Institute dried flow ers in their natural colors and shape have been exhibited. The process of preservation is this: A metallic vessel is provided with a is removed, and a wire gauze of moderate | Platte to Cape St. Roque. fineness is fitted into the top of the vessel, when the cover is replaced. Sufficient sand to fill the yessel is first sifted and then placed in an iron pot with a small 100 pounds of sand. The mixture is heated, and carefully stirred, so as to is too poor to grow it. equally diffuse the stearin. The first vessel is then turned upside down, the bottom cover removed, and the flowers to be operated on are placed in the wire gauze. after which the prepared sand is gently poured in so as to cover the Cowers entirely, the leaves being thus prevented from touching each other. This vessel is ther put in a hot place-such, for instance. as the top of a baker's oven-and left for 48 hours. The vessel is then taken out. and, while still bottom upward, the lower cover is removed and the sand runs out through the gauze, leaving the flowers uninjured and dry, yet still retaining their natural colors.

A Good Invention. - A valuable fire escape has been introduced in England in a form convenient for travelers, and as safe and easy to use as a flight of stairs. Within a thin metallic case only 71 inches in diameter, are coiled on a pulley thirty feet of light, strong and flexible steel-wire rope or tape, passing out between rollers adjusted by a hand screw to any desired pressure, and terminating in a hook for fastening to a window seat. A chair for the body, formed of leather straps, is attached to the case, and the hook being secured to the window seat, the person seated in the chair may regulate or arrest at pleasure his own descent, by means of the screw. By using fine steel wire, woven into a tape, sixty feet might be coiled in a smaller case than that above described, making a perfect fire escape portable in every one's carpet bag.

The salt wastes gradually away during the burning. and must, therefore, be renewed from time to time. Lithosiderites, or mixed stone and iron; from the Greek Lithos and Sideros, iron. III. Siderites, consisting chiefly of iron.

The first class Litholites embraces three sub classes. 1. Entrictic, or distinct earthy individuals; Crystalline. 2. Dyscritic, or indistinct earthy individ-

uals. 3d Anthracite or black. The second class Lithosiderites embraces two sub-classes. I. Pleiotholithie or more than half stony. 2 Meitholithic, or less

than half stony The third class Siderites, includes two sub-classes. 1. Psatharic, or brittle. 2 Apsatharic, or tough. Each of these sub-classes is subdivded

into several orders, which cannot be here enumerated. Under these orders he has arranged two hundred and eleven varieties, stating when and where each was found.

Under the head of Meteoric Minerals he enumerates eighteen species which are supposed to have existed in meteorites anterior to their arrival within our atmosphere.
