ELASTIC MARBLE.—There is a curiosity to be seen at Rome, which seems to have escaped the notice of most travelers who have written on that city; it is five or six tablets of elastic marble. Being set on an end, they bend backward and forward; when laid horizontally, and raised at one end, they form a curve; if placed on a table, and a prece of wood or any other a kind of curve, each end touching the table. Notwithstanding this flexibility, they are liable to be broken if indiscreetly handled. The length of each is about two feet and a half; they are about ten inches wide and three thick. They were dug up near the town of Mondragon, in the kingdom of Naples; the grain is of Carra marble, or perhaps of the finest Greek; they they are perhaps susceptible of a polish. The marble slabs are doubtless the saccharine carbonated lime of Hany, or granular limestone, which is generally white, and found to be slightly flexible. M. Fleuvian de Belvue succeeded in making completely flexible by exposing them to a certain degree of heat. A slab of marble similar to the above is to be seen in the British Museum.

MILK AND WATER.-It makes a great difference whether water is given to the cow or to the can. Dr. Dancel, in a communication to the French Academy of Sciences, adduces proof that the yield of milk can be considerably increased by quantities of water, and by moistening their food, with very little, if any, of the peculiar effect produced by experieration. 
