Worms on APPLE TREES .- Last year, says a correspondent of the Ohio Farmer. my orchard of about one hundred apple and blossoms by the apple-tree worm or of the tea more obtuse." caterpillar. I tried several ways of destroying them without success. They are appearing again this spring in numbers that are astonishing-from three to five hundred of the small webs or nests on single trees; the limbs are literally covered. To get rid of them without destroying the trees seems impossible. I would like to learn from you. or some of your readers, a remedy to destroy or speedily remove them.

Answer .- We presume our correspondent has a visitation of the pest known as the tent caterpillar, which congregate in tent-like nests upon the trees. If this is so, the effectual remedy is to capture the whole colony while they are in their tents of a cool morning or evening, or rainy day. We have had a perfect success for many years, by using a swab upon a pole. Dip the swab in strong ley of wood ashes, and wind up the tent and its inhabitants The ley rubbed upon the branch will kill any stragglers which may escape the winding. Some people blow up the tents with squibs of powder in a shotgun. There are several remedies which are effectual, if thoroughly applied.

DISEASE IN SHEEP .- At the meeting of the Philadelphia Agricultural Society. the subject of Cahicia Aguasa, or Rot, which is a disease prevalent among sheep. was@brought up. and Dr. R. M'Clure. V. S., being called upon, stated that the cause of the disease was from feeding sheep in low and marshy lands. It was an affection of the liver, accompanied by general debility. The symptoms were a yellowness of the membrane of the eye. mouth and nose. The treatment is by removing the animals from these low. marshy grounds to uplands. The sheepgrowers on the Nile, when that river overflows its banks, immediately take the animals to the high lands. In the early stages of the complaint it is scarcely discernible. The doctor recommended that the farmer, when he discovers that his sheep do not treely partake of food, and exhibit symptoms of debility, should take one or two, kill them, and make an examination. By so doing, he might prevent a heavy loss by the dreadful disease above mentioned. ---

SMALL FARMS AND FRUIT .- A New York farmer makes the following suggestion in regard to small farms: In many cases, where large farms are divided, there is o no orchard. But the enterprising beginner may do well by raising small fruits Granville C. Thurman-for the sum of \$125 while his orchard is growing.
