PARDON PROCLAMATION.

The President's pardon proclamation w. s finally prepared, and issued on the 9th. It is given in full in the Oregonian dispatches. The preamble begins with a review of the ac tion of Congress in July, 1861, when it was declared that the war was not waged in any spirit of oppression, nor for any purpose of conquest or subjugation, nor for the purpose of overthrowing or interfering with the rights or established institutions of the States; but to defend and main tain the supremacy of the Constitution, preserve the Union in all its dignity with the equality of the rights of the several States unimpaired. Alludes to the proclamation of the President in December, 1833, and March, 1864, offering amnesty and pardon to all persons who had directly or indirectly participated in the then existing rebellion, except as in those proclamations was specified and reserved, and next takes up the proclamation of May, 1865, further granting pardons, upon the condition that such persons should take and subscribe to an oath therein prescribed, which oath should be registered for permanent preservation. Again, on the 2d day of April, 1865, when it was said in a similar way that the insurrection was at an end, and thence concludes that "There no longer exists any danger, nor is any to be apprehended, within the States which were involved in the late re bellion, or any unlawful resistance by the people of said States to the Constitution and laws of the United States," following with a specification

That the full pardon described in said proclamation of the 29th of May. 1865; shall henceforth be extended to all persons who directly or indirectly participated in the late rebellion, with the restoration of all privileges, immunities and rights of property, except as to property with regard to slaves, except in cases leading to proceedings under the law of the United States; but upon their condition, nevertheless, that every such person who shall seek to avail himself of this pardon, shall take and subscribe to the following out's, and shall cause the same to be registered for permanent preservation in the Washington City, D.
