PROBSTIER OATS .-- This variety of oats is thus referred to by a correspondent : " I commenced with five quarts, from which I gathered two and a half bushels. Through the carelessness of a servant, one bushel of this was fed to the horses. Hence, one and a half bushel of this was sown broadcast on about half an acre, on the 6th day of April. From this I have received twenty-nine and a half bushels of spledid grain, weighing thirty pounds to the bushel. The straw is decidedly superior as forage, it being better supplied with leaves, and the stalk is by far less brittle than the common varieties.
