CORRESPONDENCE.

With sorrow I saw the announcement of the death of my respected friend Captain Francis Menes, and thinking it my duty as an old shipmate of his, (having been 1st Mate of the ship Morning Star, of which Captain Menes was Master) I write you this sketch, thinking that it will be read with interest by very many of the Captain's warm friends and acquaintances on this coast, and also in France.

The Morning Star was a French-barge and belonged to a French company—V. Marzou & Co. of Havre De Grace, France—and was sent by them to Oregon. It left Havre De Grace in December, 1846, for Brest, to take part of a cargo belonging to Arch Bishop Blanchard, which, together with ten priests, seven nuns and three brothers, also took passage and accompanied us to Oregon. The vessel left Brest in January, 1847; arrived at the Columbia river Bar on the last of June; crossed the bar July 10th, and arrived at the mouth of the Willamette on the fifteenth of the same month. Here we discharged our passengers and the cargo belonging to the Bishop, as we could not reach Portland from inability to cross the bar at the mouth of the Willamette river. The fraternity proceeded to locate themselves at Oregon City.

We then returned down the Columbia river, and leaving Astoria in the latter part of August, 1847, sailed for Tahiti where we arrived about the 1st of October. Here we discharged the remainder of our cargo and sailed to Valparaiso, where we received instructions to go to Peru to obtain a cargo to take to Havre De Grace.

We immediately set sail for this point and obtained a cargo of saltpetre, which we landed at Havre De Grace, in September, 1848, after a voyage of fifteen months—making our home there for a few months. In the last of November (as near as I can recollect) I visited the home of Capt. Menes in France, it then being his intention to remain there for life, if the business of Marzou & Co. could get along without his services. But the company required him to make another voyage to Oregon, to establish a French settlement here, which he reluctantly undertook. So in December, 1848, we left Havre De Grace, and reached the Columbia river Bar about the middle of July, 1849; remained outside of the bar seven days waiting for a Pilot. But no pilot could be obtained, and by advice of the captain of an American brig, who informed us that Mr. Reave, the Bar Pilot, had been drowned in the Bay of San Francisco, it was agreed that both vessels should cross the bar as soon as the wind was favorable. Captain Menes, having crossed once before, consented to go ahead while the other vessel should follow, but in doing so took the wrong direction, for the channel had changed since 1847, and the Morning Star was badly wrecked for nine hours on the bar with very heavy weather against us. The American ship, I forget the name, which had been in our wake, passed us about 500 yards. She struck the bottom at several places, but passed on—she drawing but about six or seven feet of water, while the Morning Star drew 16 feet. We lost all the small life-boats of the Morning Star while attempting to lower them to save the crew, at which time one man was drowned. The keel was lost from the stern and the huller lost—leaving the vessel unmanageable—but, through Providence interceding in our behalf, and the courage of the captain and crew, it was brought to Baker's Bay with four feet of water in the hold. This was a most miraculous escape. Most of the pumps were broken, and it was almost impossible to keep her afloat; but with the courage and skill of the Captain and crew, and the aid of Mr. Latta, a river pilot, who brought to our assistance a number of Indians who were kept constantly at work pumping and bailing, we reached a place of safety. We built a box rudder with which we succeeded in steering the vessel up the Columbia river to Portland and landed where the Allen & Lewis warehouse now stands, which all pioneers of Oregon will well remember. Here we succeeded in saving the cargo, and the hull was sold to Messrs. Conch & Flanders, and by them to Mr. Charles Hatchings, who afterwards burned her for the iron and copper, as the cheapest way to convert his investment to good account.

In 1849, Capt. Menes opened a French store in Oregon City, for Marzou & Co. in which I continued as clerk until 1853. In 1850 Dr. John McLaughlin became a partner, and continued so until 1853—in which year the business was closed, and Captain Menes located himself at St. Louis, (French Prairie) Marion county, where he resided until his sudden death on the 25th of December last.
