Do they emit a bad smell? STARING SEED BEFORE SOWING .- This practice, is not so extensively adopted in this country as it might be with advantage both for the farm and the garden. In this respect, we are far behind a people whom we are apt to regard with feelings nearly approaching to contempt. There are few @ probably, who are not disposed to think 1 thouselves much superior to the Chinese, and yet, in one respect at least, we think they are much in advance of farmers, in either England or America. 
