TO KEEP BUTTER HARD .- A writer recommends to the ladies a very simple way for keeping butter nice and cool in the bottest weather. Procure a large new flower-pot, of sufficient size to cover the batter plate, and also a saucer or dish large . in the sancer, and on this place the plate of butter, so that its edge will not be below the water. The hole in the pot must be fitted with a cork; the butter will then be in what we may call an air-tight Schamber. Let the whole of the outside of the flower pot be then thoroughly drenchnight, the butter will be as firm as a rock formity relieved by long rows of at breakfast time; or, if placed there in the morning, the butter will be quite hard for use at tea time. The reason of this is. that when water evaporates it produces cold-the porous pot draws up the water, which in warm weather quickly evaporates from the sides, and that cools it; and as no comes firm and cool in the hottest days.

-COOKING APPLES .- Mrs. F. D. G., one of the most notable house-wives and best cooks in the State, has a new way of cook. ing apples, at least it was new to our informant, and may be to many others. She pares the apples and quarters them, plac. ing them in a tin plate with the core side up; if dried apples, a little water is added; they are then set in the oven, which is always hot at meal time, and roasted. When done they are slid on a common plate, and sprinkled with sugar, to be eaten warm, with bread and butter and cakes. It would require canned fruit of extra flavor, to tempt one from the apple-dish, thus prepared. Canned strawberries and peaches are not to be talked of in the same day. 4.4.0

TOBACCO IN FRANCE.
