

It will be remembered that the Honolulu brought us verbal intelligence that the Mexican Congress had adjourned without having ratified the treaty. The war, therefore, has doubtless been resumed.

FRANCE.—The Republic is established and recognized throughout France without resistance; the first step towards calling a National Assembly has been taken,—there is to be one representative for every forty thousand inhabitants—every man 25 years old is eligible to office—all 21 years of age to elect by ballot—universal suffrage, and the vote to be secret. Election was to take place on the 9th of April—the Assembly to convene on the 20th of April. To this Assembly is to be submitted the form of government and the framing of a constitution, which will undoubtedly be republican. The total number of representatives in the National Assembly, including Algiers and the French colonies, to be nine hundred.

Commerce had in a measure revived—mechanics had commenced their work, and the people seemed to have forgotten that a revolution had taken place.

Louis Napoleon Bonaparte has been civilly requested by the Provisional Government to leave France until matters were more settled. He is a candidate for the National Assembly for the department of Seine.

A party of 25 Polish emigrants had proceeded to Poland to raise the standard of rebellion. Their countrymen in Paris awaited with great anxiety the result of their efforts. If the Poles should raise it will be extremely difficult to prevent the French people from flying to their aid, and that being done, the result will be a general European war.

It is reported that the example of France has been followed by Austria and Prussia. In the capitals of both countries, fighting had taken place and many lives had been lost. Germany wishes for a Parliament. Hungary is said to have declared for a Republic. Lombardy is on the eve of insurrection;—the peasants of Wurtemberg are burning down the castles of the nobility. All the States are arming. Commerce is at a stand, and a European war, or the general establishment of democracy, is inevitable.

The Emperor of Austria has consented to the liberation of the press, and the establishment of a National Guard. Some of the people (number unknown) have laid down their lives for the common liberty, and Austria has ceased to be an Absolute Monarchy.

The death of Nicholas, Emperor of Russia, is announced.

The court of Inquiry in the City of Mexico had terminated its sittings. Gen. Scott has come off triumphant, and has left for the States.

The insurrection of the Indians in the state of Yucatan presents a formidable and dreadful aspect,—the Indian force is represented to be from thirty to fifty thousand. Death and fire mark their progress,—the inhabitants were fleeing before them in all directions.
